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



Message from Ian

My car is due an MOT this month and I'm dreading it. It's reached the age where things feel OK but when the expert looks at it things go wrong. You end up with a complete litany of things that need fixing and face the choice of scrapping it and buying a new car or sticking with what you've got for another year. However much we dread the cost of the MOT it is still something worth having. The thought of coming down Farleigh Wallop hill to find there is an issue with the brakes is not a thought I want to linger on.



The season of Lent is going to start in March but needs some preparation time. Lent, along with Advent, is a time when those of us who are Christians are supposed to put their faith through a bit of an MOT. When I was a Vicar in North London the Diocese did this very seriously. The Clergy had to ask five people to fill in an appraisal. We were then summoned to meet with what felt like an inquisitor who would go through the reports. We all vaguely dreaded this because we were expected not to ask people who were friends but some, at least, who found our ministry challenging. The inquisitor always turned out to be wise and kind who fed back 5 good things we were going and a couple of things that needed sorting out. One of mine, was always scruffy shoes and untidy hair no idea what happened to that!

So here are two questions for you to think about in the run up to Lent. Firstly, how much have you been praying and reading your Bible recently. If the answer is "not much" the Church of England has a really good app called daily prayer that, if you don't live in the dead zone around Preston Candover is worth accessing.

Secondly, how frequently are you are attending Church? When your Church doesn't have a service could you go along to one of the other Churches in the Benefice in Lent.

Finally, and this applies regardless of the faith we possess, how are we responding to the human need that exists in Basingstoke and Winchester. How much have we given to the foodbanks that provide urgent support to people who ae homeless or on benefits?

Taking stock is something you can do on your own, but it is more effective if we find someone who is kind and wise to help us set targets and make a success of this special time of year

Our programme this spring is inspired by the beauty and grandeur of the sea and showcases two major British composers.

Vaughan Williams was deeply inspired by the poetry of American writer, Walt Whitman, whose verses from 'Leaves of Grass' form the text of both 'A Sea Symphony' and the shorter choral work, 'Toward the Unknown Region'. Whitman's expansive and humanistic vision of the sea, a metaphor for both the natural world and the spiritual journey of mankind, appealed strongly to Vaughan Williams. The symphony captures the grandeur, mystery, and awe of the ocean, while at the same time representing human experience and exploration. It is remarkable as one of the earliest major choral symphonies in the English repertoire. Composed between 1903 and 1909, it premièred at the Leeds Festival in 1910, with Vaughan Williams himself conducting. Each of the two works is a powerful testament to Vaughan Williams' ability to blend poetry and music into a unified, stirring experience.

Benjamin Britten's 'Four Sea Interludes' extracted from his 1945 opera 'Peter Grimes', are some of the most evocative orchestral music in the 20th-century classical repertoire. In the opera, the interludes serve as atmospheric transitions between each scene, but are frequently performed, as in our concert, as a stand-alone suite. The Suite remains one of Britten's most popular orchestral works and is a powerful example of his ability to fuse musical drama and atmospheric depiction. All three works in the concert regularly captivate audiences with their rich imagery and emotional depth, inviting listeners to travel on a profound and majestic journey across the seas of the world and the human soul.

We are delighted to be joined once again by our friends from Croydon Philharmonic Choir, as well as a professional orchestra and soloists, making this a concert not to be missed; so join us on our seaward travels.

At our January meeting, we listened to a speaker from St Michael's Hospice. She told us about the services and care, which is offered to adults with an end-of-life diagnosis. This includes a wide range of conditions including motor neuron

disease, dementia and cancer. The Hospice has 10 rooms but also offers care at home, helping patients to die in their place of choice. The cost to provide these

services is $\pounds 6.2m$ per year which is $\pounds 15,000$ per day, 84% of which is fundraised.

The holistic care is focussed on the individual which includes symptom control, pain management, therapies and other living well services. There were many stories from close relatives who have experienced the services.

We also heard from Tricia Jones who is a wonderful storyteller, as those of you who she taught at Cliddesden School will remember. She read a Joyce Grenfell story about a group of nursery children who were asked to pretend to be flowers. With one little boy saying he wanted to be a cauliflower.

Our next meeting is on 17th February at 10:30 for anyone who would like to join us where our speaker will be Jane Leese, whose talk is on being a Vicar and a mother.

This time of year, is not only one of reflection, but also of ambition. With this in mind, we will look forward to the lighter evenings and positive aura that the Spring inevitably brings.

To round off 2024, I had the pleasure of being able to attend the Bramley Christmas Tractor Run driving one of our John Deere tractors. The event was raising money for two organisations: Alzheimer's Society and Pelican Cancer Foundation. With almost 100 machines and countless spectators lining the roads, the event was incredibly received by all those involved. The event is growing exponentially, and it was fantastic to see so members of the farming community congregate from far and wide, their tractors all decorated very festively indeed. From a giant LED nutcracker to a trailer 'sleigh', there were some fabulous efforts on show! The route spanned Bramley, Tadley, Pamber End and finished up at Silchester Farm, hosting us for some well-earnt refreshments. I wish to express my thanks to the Estate for supporting me in this fundraising event.

I wanted to speak briefly this month about our 3 full-time staff on the farm. Although a segment of our local community has known them for many years, I wanted to try and provide some wider context for those who are newer to the three villages.

Cliff: Cliff joined what was, at the time, Farleigh Farms as foreman in 1984 and completed his 40th harvest with us last summer! He will be seen most driving the combine in summertime and is our main sprayer operator yearround. Cliff's knowledge of the topography has been pivotal as farming practices have evolved over the course of time.

Rose: Rose is another long-standing member of the Farleigh Wallop team, renowned for her role at the farm dairy and with young stock in the past. She has become a valued member of the arable farming side, known for her immaculate hedge-cutting and friendly waves from the cab of her tractor over harvest.

Andy: Andy came to Farleigh in 2022 and brought with him a wealth of knowledge in John Deere machinery. Primarily, Andy is our drillman, responsible for the planting of seed into the ground. He is more widely famed for his workshop wizardry, and meticulous attention to detail!

Looking ahead, the team's next major project will be preparations for spring drilling, which (hoping that the weather is kind to us!) will be due to commence in March. A proportion of these spring crops will be planted

Salt Bins

HCC's network of blue and yellow community salt bins has been refilled ready for the coming months, making salt freely available for anyone to spread on local roads and pavements – useful to 'join up' with the salting on main roads by our gritters.

A little salt goes a long way, you'll only need one tablespoon to treat up to a square metre of road or pavement.

If you're able to, salting your local roads when it's forecast to be icy can be a big help for your community, reducing the risk of incident and injury, especially for those who are less mobile.





Talking about money isn't always easy. So much so that 90% of young people feel uncomfortable discussing finances. We know the result of not seeking help earlier, as 1 in 5 young people who come to us have a debt problem. So we know it's pretty important to reduce the stigma around money.



Budget planners can help you understand what you're earning and spending, and where you might be able to cut costs. You can use the free planner on www.moneyhelper.org.uk/en/everyday-money/ budgeting/budget-planner. Try to find your most recent bank statements, payslips and proofs of income, debit and credit card statements or bills and receipts for things you usually pay for. Remember to include all your expenses, for example money you spend on your partner or family. You may have savings you don't know about. Your parents might have bought Bonds when you were younger or if you were born between 1 September 2002 and 2 January 2011 you may have a Child Trust Fund waiting for you of up to £1000 or more. If you'd like to find your Child Trust Fund but you're not sure how, The Share Foundation (www.sharefound.org) and Gov.uk can help you.

If you're behind on your bills you should work out what's a priority and nonpriority bill.

A belated Happy New Year to you all. As always, the end of year was an incredibly busy time at school. Here is a round up for you...





Congratulations to our **school Basketball Team** who came runners up in the annual Basingstoke Schools competition. The team won all the games in their group and beat St Mary's in the semi-finals.

The final against St John's was tough and we narrowly lost. Still a great achievement for our small school and we were awarded the Best Small School Trophy. Coming runners up means that there is a very good chance we will qualify for the county finals in May.

Football – Chiltern Primary vs Cliddesden

A fiercely competitive match from the start. Both teams were eager to make an impact and take the lead. Cliddesden subbed James in and within minutes he scored giving us a 1-0 lead. Following some scrappy play right in front of the goal mouth, Taylor managed to

slip the ball in giving Cliddesden a 2-0 lead. This was short lived as Chiltern, determined not to give up, scored and then scored again soon after to even the match. So, at 2-2 with just minutes to go and both teams giving it their all, Chiltern managed a 3rd goal.

Both teams played with passion and determination, and we are looking forward to our next match.

Willow Class – Parent Workshop

We started the day listening to the story of Can't you sleep, Little Bear by Martin Waddell. We sequenced the story and retold it to our adults in the afternoon. We all remembered the story really well.

We all learnt how to make a lantern to help us see in the dark. We lit the lanterns and turned out the lights. It felt spooky and amazing! We spoke to our adults about how we felt.



Mrs Nicholson showed everyone how to make a sentence about how we felt. We orally rehearsed it first, counted cubes to remember the sentence and looked at word and phonics mats to chop and blend sounds in the words. Our adults were quick learners and helped us to write our sentence. The year 1 children extended their sentence with the wow word 'because'. Everyone read their sentence again which resulted in the children producing some super writing.

Willow class enjoyed meeting Harold the giraffe from our SCARF programme. Harold and Caroline talked to us about bouncing back from challenges. We learnt that sometimes Harold finds things difficult and what he does to overcome his difficulties. Harold explained he used a magic word yet at the end of the sentence. So, we practised saying what



we found tricky and what difference it made when we added yet. I can't subtract - yet! Harold taught us a song about not giving up and we sang it beautifully!

Beech Class learned all about our brain and how it is where our feelings begin. Harold visited us with a very heavy bag, which was making it hard for him to eat, sleep and play because it was getting in the way. We explored what was inside Harold's bag to see if we could help. It was filled with emotions like disappointment, loneliness, worry, frustration and excitement. Together, we discovered ways to manage these feelings, such as finger and balloon breathing, doing the tree pose and practising deep belly breathing with a toy. By the end, Harold's bag felt much lighter, and we all felt more confident in handling our emotions.

In Chestnut Class, the children learnt all about the different functions of the brain, including the vocabulary hippocampus (the memory saver), prefrontal cortex (the wise leader), amygdala (the security guard) and the brain stem (the site manager). Harold came to visit and talked about a problem he was having a school and the children talked about people he could talk to including his teacher, his peers, a trusted adult or his family. The children worked in groups looking at different scenarios, they discussed how they feel when something happens that is outside of their control. A fantastic workshop focusing on wellbeing and positive thought.

So, let's think about more food, a hearty soup, make extra and freeze in portions.

Celeriac, Bacon and Barley Soup. serves 4

Ingredients

Tbsp Butter
Smoked Streaky Bacon Rashers finely sliced
Fresh Rosemary sprigs
Onions, finely chopped
g Celeriac peeled and chopped into 1 cm chunks
g Pearl Barley
T5 litres good quality vegetable stock
Crème Fraîche for serving
Nutmeg for serving

Method

Heat the butter in a large pan on a medium heat, then fry the bacon and leaves from 1 sprig of rosemary until crisp. Then add the chopped veg and reduce the heat. Cook gently for 15 minutes until softened. Finely chop the other 2 sprigs of rosemary and add to the pan for the last 2 minutes. Stir in the pearl barley and stock, then bring to the boil. Season, then simmer for 40 minutes or until the barley is soft and the soup is thick. Taste and season. Serve with a dollop of the Crème Fraîche and a grate of Nutmeg on top and of course some lovely bread.

We had a good discussion about how our emotional state may be affected by our hormones as we turn into teenagers. We also thought about how we can respond to people kindly, even if we have to say no. We ended the session with a relaxing video and we were all impressed by the sparkly lights! It was great to see Caroline and Harold (the giraffe) again.



On Wednesday 13th November, the Year 4's set off for their residential to Stubbington Study Centre for two nights. Our first activity before lunch was Earthquake, the group was split into two teams and given life-saving equipment including ladders, a first aid kit, food and water, a blanket and a rescue dog. The children had to use teamwork and resilience to complete the course without touching the floor

or losing their items. Only a few wet feet after the water swing and it was time for lunch in the snuffle hole. After lunch the children had some time to unpack and familiarise themselves with the centre before some free time meeting the other schools in the adventure playground and football pitch. We had a wildlife talk in the evening before supper and bed. Thursday morning, after a fabulous cooked breakfast we set out into the conservation area to find out why trees are important part of our ecosystem, the children used their mapping skills. Thursday evening the children discovered pirates had stolen treasure from the Stubbington Office and had to use their teamwork and investigation skills to solve the mystery, the children loved running around the centre finding all the missing pirates and after a trial held in the Snuffle Hole the guilty party was named. Before bed the children went to the Hyde and were lucky enough to watch a family of badgers and some foxes tucking into their supper, it was a fantastic way to end our day.

After packing our bags on Friday morning and filling themselves up with a cooked breakfast we headed out to complete our last activity. A teamwork activity saw them working in groups of four walking planks along the field, lots of different strategies were used and they worked brilliantly together. Lastly, the children were given black out googles and followed a roped activity climbing under nets and through tunnels, it was great fun and the children were great at supporting each other.

Overall, the children described the residential as fabulous, fantastic, amazing and confidence building.

On Thursday 21st November 2024 we held our annual Be Bright, Be Seen day. Through class and whole school assemblies, the children have been



learning about the importance of dressing to be easily seen when they are using the roads as either a pedestrian or cyclist. They learnt about wearing bright colours during the day and reflective material when it is dark. For the Be Bright, Be Seen day the children used the knowledge they have gained to choose their brightest outfit and wore it to school. A voluntary donation of £1 per child was collected and we raised a total of £94 for Children in Need.

Our Salvation Army Brass band Carol service was as lovely as ever and we raised £120 for those who are less fortunate than ourselves this Christmas.


