

#### **Dear Friends**

Archbishop Justin Welby has announced that £100 million is going to be invested in community projects specifically aimed at helping families affected by the slave trade.

Clearly reparations for slavery are a vast topic but this excerpt from an article in Premier Christianity magazine might be helpful. Full text online under the 'Opinion' section of the January edition.

Written by Bishop (Pentecostal church) Mike Royal who describes himself as second generation Windrush, whose... "late parents came to the UK from Jamaica in the 1950s. They longed to see change in their lifetime. As Martin Luther King once said: "The moral arc of the universe is long, but it bends towards justice"

What's striking about the Church Commissioners report (Church Commissioners Research into Historic Links to Transatlantic Chattel Slavery) is the forensic, financial rigour that has been applied. It begins with a historical account of the Queen Annn's Bounty, the South Sea Company and its links to the slave trade.

It then outlines the methodology used to review and detail 8,500 transactions in the ledgers of the Queen Anne's Bounty, associated activities and links to the South Sea Company. An analysis by an independent firm of accountants concluded that an estimated third of all benefactions (donations) to the bounty came from people likely linked to the slave trade.

Truth be told, a £100m is a drop in the ocean in terms of righting the wrongs of the slave trade. What value can be put on a human life? However, it does attempt to direct compensation in the right direction. With the Quakers having also recently made announcements about slavery reparations, is the Church finally coming to terms with its past?"

"Mike Royal is a Pentecostal Bishop with the Apostolic Pastoral Congress, a social justice advocate and the current general secretary of Churches Together in England. He was previously the co-chief executive of The Cinnamon Network and is a founding trustee and former national director of Transforming Lives for Good (TLG)."

From reflecting on the abhorrence of the slave trade to the immediate matters in our lives. In the book and workshops on 'Healing Wounded History', Rev Dr Russ Parker speaks about bringing

healing to those in churches and communities who have been wounded and faced tough, broken or bewildering situations, often for historic reasons, injustices both in word and deed wound us and bring limitations to healthy relating in family, church, village life, the workplace and so on. Our yearning for justice it is an inherent part of us and ultimately God will bring justice. As quoted earlier, "The moral arc of the universe is long, but it bends towards justice" There is opportunity now, for those who will, to reconcile,

acknowledge their role in sad history, to seek forgiveness and reconciliation, and the Christian understanding of reconciliation is to bring healing of relationships through the grace of God in Christ, beginning with ourselves before God. There is healing, flourishing and blessing to be had.

# St John's Northington Launch of Organ Conservation and Restoration Project News update: December 2022

The PCC of St John's Church Northington is pleased to announce the formal launch of its Organ Conservation and Restoration Project. The PCC was delighted and grateful to have received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant towards this exciting heritage project. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, and with additional support through a successful fundraising campaign including a grant from the Hampshire and the Island Historic Churches Trust and generous private donors, this will not only ensure the conservation of our heritage instrument, but it will also deliver an associated inspiring and creative education and community programme.

The project, which will run until the end of January 2024 (although the Organ itself will be back in use by early May 2023), was launched during November with a community event in Northington Village Hall, and a concert in St John's by local choir, Vox Lucis. The education and community programme will be facilitated by music animateur, Neil Valentine. This dynamic role will help to highlight the heritage of the church and its organ through, amongst other things, workshops for children, organ and choir concerts and participatory community music events working with a range of partners including Hampshire Music Service and the Grange Festival. At the heart of the education involvement is an innovative approach which will see students from Perins School, Alresford, working on a cross curricular English, History, Film, and Creative Arts programme, resulting in a new, young peopleled, digital guide to the heritage of the church.

We will keep you in touch with progress and events via the Oxdrove, Hill and Dale, and via our new website which the Lottery grant will also enable us to create. Work on the organ itself will start from the New Year.

It's always a joy to hold a tiny 'bundle of joy' and baptise a child and pray God's blessing on that young life. Sometimes it seems that the sacrament of baptism is not very well understood for what it is and is thought of more akin to 'folk religion', something rather superstitious than about Christian faith. Understandably parents want to fulfil a need for a rite of passage to mark one of life's miracles and a having a child baptised clearly is part of that. So, in preparation with parents, I explain the Christian understanding of why a child may be baptised, what we say in the service and why, since there are of course Christian theological reasons to appreciate! A Parish Priest is obliged to a) baptise a child from the parishes they serve (not beyond) and b) prepare parents who bring a child for baptism, it's in the job description.

Baptism is so much more than the application of water! There are commitments to the Christian belief in God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit and a commitment to be "faithful in private prayer and public worship" from parents and godparents. At this stage in preparation many parents will know they lack in both areas but the grace of God is invitational and so moving on with integrity on the Christian pathway is the best response at that point.

Parents and godparents make declarations in the service in response to various questions and declare:

"I turn to Christ, I repent of my sins, I renounce evil". (The world the flesh and the devil, as in the Book of Common Prayer).

Then follow statements of belief, trust and assent that the parents and godparents believe in Jesus as Son of God, who died for us and rose again and that they trust in the Holy Spirit to give new spiritual life.

Some couples feel that they can't say those things with integrity and so are invited to have a 'Service of Thanksgiving' instead, assuring the parents that a baptism is always available for those who believe, of any age.

But what happens to a child when it is baptised? Clearly it gets wet! But if the promises made in the service are kept and prayers are answered the child will 'come to faith' or, as Jesus put it, 'be born again' or 'converted' and then in the Anglican tradition may be confirmed by the Bishop.

And that is the thing, coming to faith. Being baptised and not coming to faith is like being given a cheque for millions of pounds as a baby and never cashing it in while there is so much treasure waiting to be claimed! Never coming into the full blessing of God in Christ; Salvation, forgiveness, filled with the Holy Spirit, alive to Christ, to know one's true identity as a child of God with a heavenly Father and being part of his family. These are spiritual realities precious for many but not realised for the baptised but 'not yet Christian' child.

#### **Personal Independence Payment**

If you need extra help because of an illness, disability or mental health condition you might be able to get Personal Independence Payment (PIP). You can make a PIP claim whether or not you get help from anyone.

You don't need to have worked or paid National Insurance to qualify for PIP, and it doesn't matter what your income is, if

you have any savings or you're working.

#### The main eligibility rules

To get PIP you must find it hard to do everyday tasks or get around because of a physical or mental condition. You must have found these things hard for 3 months and expect them to continue to be hard for another 9 months.

You must be living in England or Wales when you apply - unless you or a close family member are in the armed forces.

You must be at least 16 years old to get PIP.

#### Your illness, disability or mental health condition

PIP is not based on the condition you have or the medication you take. It is based on the level of help you need because of how your condition affects you. You're assessed on the level of help you need with specific activities. It's hard to say if the level of help you need will qualify you for PIP. But, if you get or need help with any of the following because of your condition, you should consider applying:

- · preparing and cooking food
- · eating and drinking
- · managing your treatments
- · washing and bathing
- · managing toilet needs or incontinence
- · dressing and undressing
- · communicating with other people
- · reading and understanding written information
- · mixing with others
- · making decisions about money
- · planning a journey or following a route
- moving around

The help you get may be from a person, an aid (such as a walking stick or guide dog) or an adaptation to your home or car.

Here's a point, that if all the baptised children and confirmed adults came to church regularly, what a joy that would be! What growth of faith there would be, what wonderful times of worship we would have as those who belong to Christ meet together in his presence! What prayerful impact we would have in our villages seeing God's blessing touching so many.

Give me a call, 'change gear' in the 'faith journey' and learn more about knowing Christ and being a Christian today and perhaps exploring whether confirmation is for you and your children?

Notes. Re Godparents.

"... there shall be not fewer than three godparents, of whom at least two shall be of the same sex as the child and of whom at least one shall be of the opposite sex." "Parents may be godparents for their own children provided that the child shall have at least one other godparent. The godparents shall be persons who have been baptised and confirmed and will faithfully fulfil their responsibilities both by their care for the child committed to their charge and by the example of their own godly living."

#### DUMMER AND KEMPSOTT, TWO CHALKLAND PARISHES

In late 2022, despite Covid 19, Lockdown and the difficulties in meeting to do the necessary research, the Victoria County History Hampshire group published the latest in a series of short histories of the Parishes of North Hampshire – Dummer and Kempshott, Two Chalkland Parishes. It provides a captivating picture of life throughout the centuries in small farming communities – largely self-contained yet not untouched by outside or national events.

There is a Victoria County History group in every county in England. It was founded in 1899 as a national project to write the history of every county in England. At its inception, the project was dedicated to Queen Victoria, which is how it derives its name.

The VCH aims to complete authoritative, encyclopaedic histories of each county, from the earliest archaeological records to the present day, as well as topics such as topography, landscape, and the built environment. Some VCH volumes were published over a century ago, while others are now in progress or planned. The Victoria County History is a series of publications: the iconic Red Books of county history, as well as the VCH Shorts, which focus on single parishes and towns.

#### KNIT FOR UKRAINE

So far, we have completed 2 blankets, with another one being crocheted together by

Miriam who has done a wonderful job, both knitting and crocheting.

Hope and Aid Direct has been providing humanitarian aid for the past 23 years. The charity is currently working in Ukraine delivering life supporting aid including food, medical equipment and blankets.

We will continue making the blankets and sending them on as long as anyone wishes to carry on knitting squares!

If you would like to start knitting squares for the first time, the pattern is below. There will be wool and needles available at TCC if you need them.

Completed squares can be delivered to TCC at Ellisfield Memorial Hall on Wednesday mornings from 10am to 12noon or to Sylvia Raine (01256 381221)

#### **Knitting Pattern**

This pattern makes a stable very reproducible square with a slightly patterned edge which is easier to join with crochet.

**You will need:** Double knitting yarn (acrylic is best) 4mm (UK 8) needles **Cast on two stitches.** Knit 1, then increase one stitch by knitting into front then back of 2<sup>nd</sup> stitch,

Continue increasing one stitch on every row like this until work measures 8" alongside edge and you have approximately 60 stiches depending on tension. Knit one row without increasing.

Then on next row Knit 1 and then begin to decrease by knitting 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> stitches together then Knit to end. Continue until 1 stitch remaining. Cast off.

Thankfully I get my bits delivered now so it's not so easy to just shove something in the trolley, although I do add and remove chocolate from the list several times before a delivery!



Now the recipe for February is for a pheasant supper. If you can find one of course and that doesn't cost a fortune.

#### You will need

Creamy Pheasant Pie with Sherry Mushrooms Serves 4 Oven 180c/350f/gas 4 1 Pheasant, 1 tbsp olive oil, 1 tbsp butter, 1 medium leek, cleaned and sliced 2 rashers Smokey-streaked bacon diced, 2 sticks of celery finely chopped 100g small white mushrooms halved, 2 tbsps. finely chopped tarragon 1 and a half dessert spoons of cornflour, 75 ml dry sherry 250 ml pheasant stock, 150 ml double cream

#### For the Topping

750 g swede, peeled and chopped 100 ml milk 40 g butter 1 tbsp finely chopped parsley 60 g cheddar cheese grated

Submerge pheasant in a pan of cold water and bring to a simmer and cook for about 1 hour and 20 minutes or until the meat is tender. Remove the bird cool a little then remove the meat from the bones and cut into bite size pieces. Place the cooking liquid (from the pheasant) back on the stove and reduce by half. In a separate pan on a medium heat melt the butter and oil then season and sauté the leek, bacon, celery, mushrooms, and tarragon till soft (about 20 mins) stir in the cornflour then add the sherry, 150ml of the reduced pheasant stock and the cream. Simmer for 5 minutes. Add the pheasant meat and check the seasoning.

Meanwhile cook the swede in a pan of water. When soft, drain and mash with the butter, milk and parsley, and season. Spoon the pheasant mix into a pie dish (the sort you'd use for lasagne), and top with the swede mash. Finally sprinkle on the grated cheese. Bake for 30-40 minutes or until golden and bubbling hot. Serve with some lovely greens and a hunk of crusty bread.

A few years ago now, Prince Charles had a recipe for his Pheasant crumble which was basically the same but had a buttery breadcrumb, Parmesan and crispy bacon top. Rich but delish.





#### Free Energy Surveys for small businesses in East Hampshire

The survey will also cover advice around heating systems, hot water appliances and lighting plus how ventilation could be upgraded to reduce the risk of damp and condensation. It is followed up with a written report which details all the ways in which energy costs can be reduced plus information on installers and funding.



After a steep increase in their energy bills, The Kings Arms Youth Centre in Alton contacted Energy Alton for advice on how they could heat their building more efficiently. A volunteer surveyor identified several measures to reduce heat loss - including loft and internal wall insulation, secondary glazing, thermal curtains plus replacing oil filled radiators with more efficient programmable storage heaters.

Will Schofield, Operations Manager, said "Mike was brilliant and answered all my questions – it was good to have advice on different options. I didn't have the time to research it all myself, so I really appreciated having a report which helped me create an action list."

Will is now getting quotes for much of the suggested work and is looking forward to a warmer and cheaper winter next year.

#### **New Year Resolutions**

Once upon a time, a long time ago, making New Year Resolutions was a lot of fun (?) as choosing from a long list required a lot of careful thought. The chosen few were listed, in the front of a new diary using the thin pencil kept in the spine, where these resolutions acted as continual reminders of your good intentions.

For many years now I have used an academic diary to record the farming year as August-to-August fits much better with the farming year.

#### **Keep Busy**

Activity on the farms and in the fields in January is at its lowest ebb, short days and bad weather reduce any opportunity to get on. This is speaking from an arable farmer perspective. Livestock needs to be looked after and cared for every day, feeding, milking, counting, checking and lots of other jobs that must be done. During the days of frosty weather in December keeping water supplies going took a lot of time particularly in the north of England and Scotland where the frosts and snow were severe

The first month of the year on the farms is perhaps spent in the workshop, getting ready for spring field work, which could start in February. Soil temperatures for mid Jan here are around 5'C at the moment but could still fluctuate, anyway work can't start until soils are dry enough to take wheels, and that could be while! Now is the time to get 'the ducks in a row', ready for the spring workload.

#### 'No one surely pays his debt, as wet to dry and dry to wet'.

Speaking of ducks, the total rainfall for 2022 was low, but not the lowest we have had recently. The total here was 911mm, 26 less than last year, and coincidentally the same as 2017. September October, November and December were wet, especially November which were the wettest for several years, but frost kept December dry until the 18<sup>th</sup> but still managed to accumulate 134mm by the end of the month. January 2023 has continued to be wet!!

The aquifer beneath us needed the rain and is topped up again, so the winterbournes and springs should start flowing, and the river levels will improve.

#### St Leonard's Churchyard 2022

We have at last been able to place a sign in St Leonard's churchyard with information explaining our Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC) status and its' management. The churchyard has been very sensitively cared for over the years particularly by Mr Bob Kew who sadly passed away in December 2021. His method of an annual mow of some of the churchyard, and the absence of the use of fertilisers has enabled wildflower & grass species to seed and spread. In 1997 Mrs Shirley Maunder instigated a survey of the churchyard done by the Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre. This resulted in the churchyard being given SINC status. A review survey was carried out in 2015 with positive results that we continued to maintain our status.

Since then, with help from Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust (HIWWT) and the Basingstoke Conservation Volunteers (BCV) we have been able to carry on caring for the churchyard in a sensitive manner.

We needed permission from the Winchester Diocese to erect this information post which we obtained eventually in June 2022. The post was very kindly funded by Alison Mosson of our local conservation group 3CG, and the artwork designed and donated by Mark Capehorn by his company, Theme Group.

Ross Palmer and David Randall set the post in place in September. We had to wait until then due to the hard ground caused by the summer's drought. Our friends from the BCV worked very hard at the end of November (no drought that day!!) along with some village volunteers, to give the large SINC areas their annual mow and rake. They also worked on some of the spreading bramble areas.

We hope that you will come and enjoy our churchyard. Of course, work is ongoing in order to preserve this special place.

#### It's there if you look for it

Apart from the cold spell in the first half of December, the weather has been mild, it seems to me that the wheat crops look quite green, and some buds in the hedges, eg. honeysuckle, are showing leaves, along with hazel growing catkins and feathery vermillion flowers. Daffodils and snowdrops are pushing through now to flower later in the spring. The days are getting almost imperceptibly longer now, so by February the shorter winter days will be in retreat

We have had dry springs and higher temperatures for the last year or two, as a consequence of global warming, so the changes in farming practice to reduce soil disturbance, together with our new 'best friend' Organic matter must be the right direction.

P.S. Organic matter and Soil Health have always been of major importance to good farmers, I have recently found old books and pamphlets describing the philosophy of soil health. The difference now is that we have a bit more scientific knowledge to help refine techniques and understanding.
