



Message from Ian

February was a sober month in the Benefice as we've carried our four funerals. Every time I take a funeral service, I witness the loss of a family member as a disaster for the people concerned. For many it involves intense pain coupled with a sense of unbelief.

While a funeral is over in a short time, mourning the loss is something that can go on for a long time. It is always comforting when people come up to the newly bereaved and express genuine feelings of how sorry they are, but the lives of those not so directly involved move on while we remain in the state of loss. This is something that should heal but never really goes away Over the past five years our family has lost my mother and both of my wife's parents. While they were all advanced in years each of their deaths left us with a gaping hole in our family. We still miss them and not to have them around us leaves a hole that is unlikely ever to be filled.

There is no set way to mourn the loss of someone we loved. The way we come to terms with the loss depends so much on the depth of relationship we had with them and length of time we had to prepare ourselves for their death. But there are things that we can do to help ourselves move forward. The most important is to keep the memory alive. For some this may mean going to the cemetery or having a special place that enables us to feel close to them. We have a spot in our garden where we can re member my motherin-law, we grow purple flowers and on summer evenings drink gin there. It is important not to be afraid of talking about the people we have lost. Sharing memories of what they said or did and never being afraid to laugh. Even though people are no longer with us we can still celebrate who they were and the contribution they made to our families.

Sometimes, though, we can get stuck in our grief. This is especially true when the death was traumatic or unforeseen. If you feel stuck it is important to remember that you are not alone. Talking about how you feel is such an important part of coming to terms with loss and there are several support groups available to you. Perhaps the best known is Cruse and their helpline number is 0800 808 1677

To those who have lost loved family members the Benefice would like to offer its sympathy and support. If you feel we can help you don't be afraid to get in touch.

Our programme this spring is inspired by the beauty and grandeur of the sea and showcases two major British composers.

Vaughan Williams was deeply inspired by the poetry of American writer, Walt Whitman, whose verses from 'Leaves of Grass' form the text of both 'A Sea Symphony' and the shorter choral work, 'Toward the Unknown Region'. Whitman's expansive and humanistic vision of the sea, a metaphor for both the natural world and the spiritual journey of mankind, appealed strongly to Vaughan Williams. The symphony captures the grandeur, mystery, and awe of the ocean, while at the same time representing human experience and exploration. It is remarkable as one of the earliest major choral symphonies in the English repertoire. Composed between 1903 and 1909, it premièred at the Leeds Festival in 1910, with Vaughan Williams himself conducting. Each of the two works is a powerful testament to Vaughan Williams' ability to blend poetry and music into a unified, stirring experience.

Benjamin Britten's 'Four Sea Interludes' extracted from his 1945 opera 'Peter Grimes', are some of the most evocative orchestral music in the 20th-century classical repertoire. In the opera, the interludes serve as atmospheric transitions between each scene, but are frequently performed, as in our concert, as a stand-alone suite. The Suite remains one of Britten's most popular orchestral works and is a powerful example of his ability to fuse musical drama and atmospheric depiction. All three works in the concert regularly captivate audiences with their rich imagery and emotional depth, inviting listeners to travel on a profound and majestic journey across the seas of the world and the human soul.

We are delighted to be joined once again by our friends from Croydon Philharmonic Choir, as well as a professional orchestra and soloists, making this a concert not to be missed; so join us on our seaward travels.

In the Fields—Emma Ilsley

Well, I didn't think I'd be the only contributor to the Hill and Dale who was hoping to be writing this month with a punch-line along the lines of 'Spring has sprung!' but I think it suffices to say that hasn't quite been the case yet. Nevertheless, we have had some particularly beautiful days thus far in 2025 – so often denoted by heavy frosts we wake up to, after which the sun burns through around mid-morning. These conditions have made for some lovely scenes across the Estate, both across the farming landscape, and around the House and gardens. Pausing for a moment to take in the surroundings on these sunny mornings holds such great value for us, as well as reminding us of the benefits of being in the great outdoors.

Winter jobs have continued on the farm, and two of particular prominence at present are: the servicing of the machinery, and the outgoing of crops from the grain stores.

It is imperative that annual servicing of our tractors and telehandlers is complete during this 'downtime' period, as we rely on them so heavily around the year for such a wide variety of jobs. Of course, this is supplemented by routine care and maintenance throughout the more active seasons, but this time of year is our best chance of getting any 'heavy' servicing completed.

We are continuing to empty our grain stores and have made a good start in seeing the 2024 crops vacate the farm. This will continue in a steady trajectory across the next few months, eventually leading to the end goal of the grain stores across the various sites being empty before Harvest 2025. In recent weeks, we have now added the Coat of Arms logo to the side of our tractors, combine harvester and sprayer, acknowledging all the machines

belonging to Farleigh Wallop Estate. This has added a level of uniformity to the fleet which we are very pleased with and will make us recognisable to the wider community!

Small change for hard graft.

A few weeks ago, whilst standing in the middle of a field admiring a particularly beautiful winter sunset I wondered how many others had, over time, viewed that familiar scene. The particular field is one in which there seem to be buried a higher than usual number of small denomination silver coins, all from the reign of Henry III (1216-1272).


Silver pennies at that time were hammered between two dies, one depicting the face of the king, the other a cross and pellets. Those from Henry's reign are distinctive in that they have on the reverse, a cross as an outline with, importantly, an internal void. The voided cross allowed them to be accurately cut into halves and quarters (fourths or farthings), thus allowing their use in small transactions as a monetary economy slowly evolved from one of traditional bartering and exchange. Henry also revolutionised the production of coinage by bringing in new moneyers (those who struck the coins) and centralising mints (to eventually London, Bury St Edmunds and Canterbury). Thus, the production of coinage could be more closely monitored and controlled.

Small Change for hard Graft (Cont)

Life for ordinary people in the Candover valley in the thirteenth century must have been tough, with villagers generally labouring in the fields or trading in low-value goods. Manual workers then could expect to earn 2d per day if not 'paid in kind'. This might be enough for 12 eggs and 4 loaves of bread - or good ale, tempting after a hard day's labour, but a penny a gallon. Cottage rental though, even for the poorest, could have set them back £2 per year (480d, thus equivalent to 240 days' work). In rural England at this time, many women would have also spun thread out of coarse wool whilst going about their day to generate extra income. Given that this was often a productive way to use time when meeting others and speaking to friends, it would ultimately originate the expression 'spinning a yarn'. Whether wool, baskets, woodwork, tools or other foodstuffs and livestock, local markets would have offered a financial lifeline to many, as well as a chance to procure everyday goods brought in by travelling pedlars and traders. I suspect that this is what was going on in this particular location.

Coins such as those pictured above, however, were not always simply used in legitimate trades. There were more underhand ways of bringing in extra income for those who had the requisite skills or were desperate enough, one being clipping – shearing off the edges of coins for their silver content. The reduced weight of the clipped coins devalued Henry's economy since a silver penny was, by law, a penny's worth of silver. The voided crosses also acted as an early anti-clipping measure, with the tips of the cross designed such that any clipping would be immediately evident. Despite this, in a highly decentralised economy with no formalised police or regular law enforcement, clipping remained a menace for centuries. The authorities instead relied on the threat of harsh punishments to deter clipping, and it could mean large fines, imprisonment or, in some cases loss of eyes, hands or even life. Who knows whether those in that field, all those centuries ago, also had such things on their minds.



So the recipe for this month is Naughty Joyce's Banana Nut Loaf.



Ingredients

8 oz Self Raising Flour
Half a teaspoon of Bicarbonate of Soda
A pinch of salt, 3 oz Butter, 6 oz Caster Sugar
2 Eggs, beaten
1 lb Bananas (about 3) peeled and mashed
4 oz Walnuts

Method

Heat oven to 350f, Gas 4, fan 160 c Grease and line the base of a 2lb loaf tin. Mix flour bicarbonate and salt. Cream butter and sugar together and then add eggs. Stir in flour, banana and walnuts and bake for 1 ¹/₄ hours Do keep an eye and check on it as my mum's oven cooked hers in 45 minutes. <u>Stirrings</u>

Very slowly, but collectively undeniable, the first signs of a spring are showing. Snowdrops are the stars, no doubt of that, but already grass is shooting, as new growth is replacing the decaying leaves of last year, as they return nutrients to the soil. The leaves of Cow Parsley come with a vibrant fresh green to form a rosette before the stems shoot up in late April and May.

Dank, Damp, and Cold

January has been wet. Not all the time but very wet at both ends of the month, and although very little rain actually fell in the middle of the month, it was not drying weather. Dank, cold and damp may be the best way to describe conditions as high pressure kept cloud coming over us.

The evidence of the heavy rain can be seen as the drifts of grit that was washed down to the lower areas where it sedimented out. This year there has also been a lot of soil washed out of the fields. Look out for the drifts of clay and silt, collected where the flow slows down and these particles can sediment out. That's the fertile top soil from the fields.

Watch out, there's a Gully About

The worst effect for lanes users is probably the gullies on the edges of the roads. Avoid these quite vicious gullies if you value your tyres, the future effects of the gullies will be as the road edges collapse without the edge support they had before.

Birds Singing

Birds are singing now as they stake out territory and look for a mate. Male robins have not really stopped singing all through the winter, but in January the blackbirds and song thrush began to call. As time moves on the song intensifies as other birds join in. I have also heard more tawny owls in the evenings when the moon has been out, and recently several people have seen barn owls hunting, by the school in Cliddesden and by the old dairy buildings on Grammarsham Lane.

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
