

Message from Ian

November is always a bit of a solemn month. In it, we remember the sacrifice of the Armed Forces of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth in acts of war. These remembrance events do not glorify war but seek to unite people of all faiths, cultures, and backgrounds against the horror and suffering that so many continue to face.



The problem for many is that the focus of the remembrance events can be on those who lost their lives in the first and second world wars. The sacrifice of both men and women in these conflicts absolutely deserves our pride and respect. But the direct memory of their sacrifice is rapidly moving into history. So, we also remember members of our armed services who have routinely engaged in conflicts that we have only witnessed on our televisions. Some of these were major conflicts such as the Korean war, the Gulf war, the wars in Bosnia and Kosovo, the war in Iraq and most recently Afghanistan. There are numerous other conflicts where our forces have fought to defend the democratic freedoms of other countries. Many soldiers and civilians lost their lives or were injured in the conflict in Northern Ireland, as well as the terrorist attacks we have suffered in the mainland United Kingdom.

Remembrance isn't focused just on what happened in history but also on something that continues to affect the lives of so many people; for those who have been involved in the violence of war, the trauma doesn't end when the fighting stops. The memory of what they have seen or been required to do is frequently buried deep within them and only emerges with time.

The first thing we can do to remember is buy a poppy. The Royal British Legion who run this charity continues to do amazing work with people whose lives have been affected by war. Wearing a poppy is never compulsory but it is a sign of both remembrance and commitment to those who have given so much. The ex-servicemen I know greatly appreciate those who use this to show their support.

Secondly, you are welcome to attend one of the remembrance events. Within the villages we will hold Remembrance Sunday services at St John's Northington, where we will be joined by the Royal British Legion, and at St Leonard's Church in Cliddesden.

There will also be a service of remembrance on Armistice Day held at the memorial in Preston Candover where we will be joined by the pupils of Preston Candover School. In these services we will remember the sacrifice of our armed forces. We will also pay tribute to the special contribution of families who have lost loved ones with words and hymns, but also with silence as we remember those who gave so much to uphold the things we value most.

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






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What an amazing month!

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Nicki Palmer. March 1947-August 2024

Nicki arrived off a boat from New Zealand in 1968 and hit swinging sixties London with the courage and enthusiasm that has marked her whole life. She was brave to be leaving home. I know others here did the same and made that journey round the world in the days before the technological explosion. Imagine a world without mobiles! What a relief in some ways but it made

communication much more random and difficult. In 1969 it cost in current money terms £19 for one minute on the telephone to New Zealand. The calls were therefore necessarily limited, and she missed her parents and much-loved brother, Jerry. But she was 21, very pretty, talented, great fun and

was a breath of fresh air. She never went back to live in New Zealand but got stuck in to discarding a New Zealand accent, making lots of good, close and supportive English friends who have remained great friends, and embracing the London fashion scene.

Her hospitable nature naturally led her to being a warm and generous hostess, and she became an excellent cook who made all food look delicious as well as tasting delicious. Nicki was a loving, kind, loyal and thoughtful friend. Her thoughtfulness was demonstrated in her awareness of anyone in trouble, and she would call round with a beautiful, simple bunch of flowers, or a delicious bowl of something which was irresistible. Her presents were always wrapped in brown paper and tied with green string. She must have made some supplier very happy. Her love of the outdoors led her to take up salmon fishing with enthusiasm, and that enthusiasm remained absolutely genuine in the wind and torrential rain. She was rewarded with a very respectable fish. And in the evening, she would play a highly competent game of bridge, while claiming to be hopeless.

Nicki was talented and creative. Trained as a graphic designer, she became a highly competent and creative garden designer. She had great vision and was a real expert on plants. Her passion for detail made anything she designed a work of art. I am sure she used nail scissors on some parts of her garden. And I really don't think she bought into the theory that colours in nature cannot clash. The flowers in Manor Cottage Garden are wonderfully subtle and blended.



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Her move to Ellisfield was an outstanding success. She has made her cottage and garden really lovely. She made many new friends and enormously appreciated the tremendous community spirit. And she loved this church. She regularly did the flowers, and I know she would have been thrilled by the wonderful display at her funeral. She had a deep Christian faith which brought her much solace in difficult times.

She was a devoted aunt, and godmother, taking great interest in children around the UK and the world. But her great passion in life was her family. Eloise, Jono, Toe, how she loved you all. What pride she took in your achievements, how she empathised with you on the down days. One of her great joys were those long-distance telephone calls which brought Australia and South Africa just a bit closer.

You gave her grandchildren, and one of the best presents she had was the gadget which displayed an ever-rolling montage of photographs. I don't think it was ever off, and, as it is distinctly mesmerising, happily they are nearly all old enough to remember what an exceptional grandmother they had.

And her bravery, which was such a part of her, manifested itself as she coped with her increasing ill health. She liked to be on top of things. She could not get on top of her health. She was determined to remain in control. Nicki died exactly as she would have wanted, in her bed, in her house, having had a magical Summer with most of her grandchildren. Her garden looked lovely. She was at peace.

So, Nicki, we celebrate your life – you leave a big gap. Thank you for your friendship.



Cliddesden WI October 2024

At our October meeting we enjoyed a talk from Joyce Meader on the History of Knitting from the 1800s to 1945.

Joyce presented knitted garments and patterns, this included a knitted corset cover, designed to protect valuable dresses from the stays of a corset. There were finely knitted garments for women, men and children including socks, shawls with knitted lace edging jumpers, underwear, swimsuits and dresses for babies. All beautifully knitted with very fine yarn and needles.

She also explained that a lady's maid would be expected to knit new lace at night to embellish their mistress' dresses.

The members remembered wearing swimming costumes which sagged and became very revealing when wet, this was common until the 1950s.

Joyce also explained that old patterns were designed for women of the time who were much smaller and when she reproduces garments, she often has to make several versions to fit the modern woman.

We also discussed plans for our Christmas meetings including the planned wreath making workshop on 30th November.

Our next meeting is on Monday 18th November, we have invited a speaker on being a boy evacuee.

This term's seasonal changes have brought about many opportunities for our preschool children to learn about the world around us. With a focus on hands-on experiences, children build their understanding of the environment and develop key skills in areas like observation, creativity and social interaction.



An Autumn sensory tray is an interactive activity designed to engage children's senses, offering a mulit-dimensional learning experience that support various areas of development. As children explore, they often ask about what they are experiencing, offering valuable communication opportunities. This provides opportunities to introduce new vocabulary and encourages descriptive language. Manipulating small objects helps children to develop fine motor skills. Grasping, pinching, pouring and scooping are ac-

The children have also been learning about nocturnal and diurnal animals. We have been sorting animals into each category, and learning where different animals live and how their daily routines relate to their habitats. This activity fosters curiosity about wildlife, helping children understand that animals have unique ways of living and adapting to their environments.

Hampshire County Councillor report

Savings Programme 2025

Please find attached my October report. I wanted to highlight the fact that you will be seeing a fair bit of coverage about the Savings Programme SP25. The consultation took place earlier

this year. I know the retention of HWRCs (household waste recycling centres) and school crossing patrols, maintenance of vital community transport routes and the continued provision of homelessness grants to the end of their planned contract term are important to residents. I am continuing to push for continuation of these vital services.

The Leader Nick Adams-King stated: "Before making any decisions, my cabinet colleagues and I will carefully consider the officers' recommendations in the context of the consultation responses, the feedback from the select committees and any deputations made to us."

I will be making these points at the Cabinet meeting on the 14th October.

Winter Fuel Allowance;

The Labour Government has recently made the decision to restrict the Winter Fuel Payment to only pensioners in receipt of Pension Credit or other means-tested benefits

HCC in a motion to full council resolved to:

Bring forward a Council-led local awareness campaign to alert those eligible of Pension Credit which in some respects will help access to the Winter Fuel Payment for those most in need.

- Request that the Council Leader write to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, urging a review of the decision to means-test the Winter Fuel Payment and asking the government to ensure that vulnerable pensioners, particularly those who do not claim Pension Credit, are protected from fuel poverty.
- Commit the Council to signing the 'Save the Winter Fuel Payment for Struggling Pensioners' petition being run by Age UK and to encourage all members to sign the petition themselves.
- Encourage local efforts to promote Pension Credit uptake through council services and partnerships with local charities and community organisations to ensure that all eligible pensioners in Hampshire are supported in claiming their entitlement.
- Make the commitment that all Hampshire County Council Libraries are designated under the warm spaces scheme for the winter of 2024/2025



Swede, Leek and Apple Bake. Serves 4. Oven set to 180c/gas 4

Ingredients


25g butter plus extra for greasing
2 Leeks finely shredded
4 Large Sage leaves
75ml White Wine or Apple Juice
1 Swede (800g-1kg unpeeled weight) peeled cut in half lengthways, then very finely sliced.
2 Apples cored, halved and thinly sliced
50g Cheddar Cheese

Method

Melt the butter in a large frying pan and fry the leeks on a very low heat for 12 minutes, stirring now and then. Add the sage and wine or juice Cook for 2 minutes then season. Layer the swede, apple and leeks in a baking dish, finishing with swede. Cover with foil and bake for 45 minutes. 


It was so lovely to see the children again at the start of September and to welcome our new foundation stage children and parents.

Hello From Claire

And farewell. After 6yrs it is time for someone else to bring you the news and titbits for the Horticultural Society. Thank-you for reading, and hopefully enjoying all the random things that have filled the spaces.

Who will taking over? I don't know; it will be decided at the AGM. So, if you are a budding scribe, enjoying finding out about all sorts of things to do with plants, gardens and how to help them grow, come along to the AGM, wave your hand in the air and cry 'ME ME ME!!!' As with all things to do with the society, it is voluntary, and it is fun.

So, for my final offering, covering November and December, let's tuck the fleece around our less hardy shrubs, pop the pots of delicates into the greenhouse, lament about clearing the leaves (again, and again, and again), grab the planner and work out what marvels we can bring about in the Spring.



I have chosen a more unusual herb for this month, planted in knot gardens in Tudor times, and taken by the Pilgrim Fathers to America where it became naturalised. Native to the Mediterranean region, used to flavour wines and taken as a tonic tea, please bid welcome to Salad Burnett. Botanical name: Poterium sanguisoba Family: RosaceaeA low-growing plant, the flower stems reach only 30cm/12" high, with coarsely toothed leaflets,

despite its rather delicate appearance is a hardy perennial and will remain green through milder winters.

The leaves have a mild cucumber taste, and the small round red flowers will appear for around 3 months during the summer.

Grown only from seed, plant during late Spring or early Autumn in good soil, Salad Burnett will readily self-sow if the flowers are left on. However, for a plentiful supply of leaves, remove the flowers and plant fresh each year as the young leaves are more tender.

Chop the freshly picked leaves into salads, use liberally in place of parsley, or mix with raw vegetables.

It will also add a fresh flavour to creamy sauces, egg dishes and white meats.

In September, our Year 6 children took part in Bikeability. This is a cycling proficiency course that we book every year. The children began by cycling in the playground where they learned how to check that their bikes are safe and



how to stop, practice how to look for traffic and the rules of the road. They then progressed onto the roads in the village and learned how to ride safely, who has priority at junctions and on the road and what the different road signs and markings mean. The sun shone all week and the children thoroughly enjoyed their time outside and learning how to be proficient cyclists.



At the beginning of October, Year 1 and Year 2 ventured through the village as part of their Geography learning adventure. Along the way, they paused to observe and discuss the human and physical features around them, noticing things like houses, a church, roads, lanes, fields and a pond. They also thought about the village's history, considering why certain things have changed over the years and how these changes have shaped the village today.





For our Harvest Sale, we collected 79kg of tinned and packet foods which were delivered to Basingstoke Food bank.

In our cake, bread, fruit and vegetable sale we raised a fantastic amount of £170 that we will send to Children in Need.

Harvest—Emma Ilsley

Not so long ago, I was the one reading the 'In the Field' articles intrigued by the agricultural work being undertaken by the team at Farleigh Wallop, so it felt a real turn of the tables when I was asked to contribute to the Hill and Dale. My name is Emma, and this has been my second harvest with the farming team at Farleigh Wallop Estate.

My love for agriculture was borne from my grandfather, Dennis Ilsley, and his career with JCB and his ties with the Estate over the years. Many hours we spent together, and from a young age I spent many a summer afternoon sat in the combine with Clifford, who is still our combine driver, and has been on the farm for a long time. As I grew older, I remember saying to them both, 'I'd love to drive a tractor like that one day' never thinking for one moment I would indeed one day be working alongside Clifford and Rose as colleagues. Although sadly my grandfather passed away before my time on the farm began in 2023, I will always be proud to think I have followed in his footsteps in this regard.

Harvest 2024 began in the middle of July, with the oilseed rape being the first crop harvested, which returned a pleasing average yield and set us up with positive spirits for the weeks ahead of us. As I write this article in late September, all of our rapeseed has now left the farm and will continue its life in Germany as sustainable hydraulic oil. Next to follow were our cereals: winter barley, winter wheat and spring barley. We are delighted that our milling wheat will head to the food chain and our barley to supply both distilling at Bimber Whiskey in London, and also for brewing for beers. There was a small break before we were able to harvest our beans in mid-September, but we were pleased with their eventual yield, following wet and mild conditions which have been ideal for the crop.

All the while the three of us were engaged in harvesting, our drillman Andy was preparing the freshly harvested stubble land for the 2025 harvest. Using a low disturbance subsoiler, Andy was aerating and alleviating soil compaction from last year's wet winter, without damaging the structure of the soil itself. This has been undertaken across a large proportion of our land now, with a cultivator running a secondary pass over the sub-soiled land to create a good tilth on the surface of the soil ready for drilling. All the while, we have stitched in time for general land husbandry, such as mowing of the field verges, to reset the margins. We have also introduced flower margins across the farm, which have graced us with wonderful sunflower displays. Now that harvest has drawn to a close, the four of us are concentrated on cultivating and drilling – Rose operating the subsoiler, myself on the cultivator, Andy operating the main drill and Clifford operating a secondary drill where required, and the sprayer.

The Sunflower – Seumas Foster

Sunflowers are probably the most eye catching flowers, that never look anything less than spectacular when the bright yellow petals and round black centres stand out so brightly.

Although not native to the UK, they have become more common here as part of wild bird and pollinator seed mixtures, but as they prefer more warmth than we have been able to offer they have been a marginal crop. Global warming and breeding of more suitable varieties has opened the market to some extent, and curious farmers will investigate new crops.

The sight of Sunflower fields in France has always been the sign that the holiday is starting. And V. van Gogh certainly got some inspiration from them.

But the sunflower has a big Achilles heel, on one hand the flower is a masterpiece of colour, design and attractive to pollinators, as well as producing a useful oil seed, while on the other hand it doesn't like English autumns!

The flower turns up to the sun and follows it through the day, the French name for the plant is 'tournesol', and the individual flowers are packed in with mathematical precision in the most efficient way, hinting at eons of evolution.

For sunflowers grown in the UK once flowering has finished problems can start. The seed head stops following the sun and droops to face down to ripen. The ideal conditions for ripening would be a hot, dry autumn but the last autumns have not met the sunflower ripening criteria!

The plant is now presenting the back of the flower head to our autumn weather. The seed head can get very soggy and quite quickly Botrytis fungus will set in as a grey mould. This can effectively destroy the seed head so there is no seed to harvest. All that work only to have the seed snatched away in a misty, moist autumn!

However keep growing them for the flowers, sometimes the seed will feed the birds, and there will still be competitions to grow the tallest sunflower, and the sight of the yellow and black flowers will brighten any summers day.

We have thus far drilled our oilseed rape, and our cover crops ahead of Spring Barley. Such cover crops aid with retention of nutrients and organic matter in the soil, and contribute to low soil disturbance cultivations, which are a feature of modern farming.

In my final few weeks with the team at Farleigh, we will continue with our efforts to cultivate and drill our cereals ahead of the winter. Weather conditions have been challenging, but we will continue to progress where we can and to remind ourselves that all farms are facing these challenges!

I wish to express my many thanks to the team at Farleigh for hosting me for my second harvest – it has been a pleasure to work with a fantastic group of people so dedicated to their work.
