

Message from Ian

It was going to be a brilliant shot. The heron was perched on the far side of a pool. The weather was perfect, the water was still. I had the camera on autofocus with the focusing square locked onto the bird. The exposure was right; all was well. I was in a hide on the other side of the road about 60 yards from the animal and all I had to do was wait. And wait and wait and wait. Just as the bird moved a couple of times and started to open its wings, a lorry drove past. When the lorry cleared the field of view the bird had gone and I was left muttering words I wouldn't have used if the bishop was sitting next to me.



One thing I've learned from wildlife and sport photography is that you are going to have missed opportunities. You look the wrong way, you focus on the wrong thing, you don't press the shutter in time, all lead to lost images that would have been competition entries. Most people can identify with this. A failed job interview, a missed appointment, a botched relationship can so easily end up with a sense of "what if."

The things that professional photographers say is don't worry about the missed opportunities, rather get ready for the next one. If we focus on the regret of not achieving what we want, we miss out on the next thing that comes along. There will also be another opportunity, but we don't grasp it by looking back. But while there will be more opportunities the number and quality of opportunities are affected by what we do. There is a well know military phrase about following the 5 p's I won't tell you what specifically these are. If you want to know, ask an old soldier. But loosely translated they say that proper preparation prevents a below standard performance. The thing I've learned as a husband, father, grandfather, priest and photographer is that the more investment I put into asituation the greater the outcome.

But what about when the outcome isn't so good? There are a few instances in my career where I deeply regret a choice I've made. I was offered two posts as a second curacy. I choose one in good faith but with hindsight should have taken the other one. When I'm in a dark mood and think about the "what if" moments I come back to the rocks in my life of faith and family and continue to be grateful for what I have.

Changes to Winter Fuel Payment

Citizens Advice Basingstoke is a charity providing free and confidential advice on a wide range of issues including benefit eligibility, homelessness, employment and energy.

The recent changes announced to the Winter Fuel Payment means that only those receiving Pension Credit or other



means tested benefits will now be eligible. If this affects you, there's other ways to get support this winter.

Grants and benefits to help you pay your energy bills

You might be able to get help if you're struggling to afford your energy bills or top up your prepayment meter. The help you get depends on how you pay for your energy, the type of energy you use and if you claim benefits Priority Services Register

You can get extra help from your gas and electricity supplier by signing up to the Priority Services Register. You can sign up if you're either of State Pension age, disabled or have a long-term health condition or considered 'vulnerable' by your energy network. Your energy network might consider you vulnerable if you don't speak or read English well, have children under 5 years old or are pregnant or have no sense of smell or would struggle to smell gas.





In the Fields—Seumas Foster

Summers end

The beginning of September is the Met office official end of summer and the start of autumn. It's the signal for us to be bombarded with talk about autumnal colours, cold nights, fires, cocoa, etc., but that's jumping ahead a bit, we don't have to rush into winter when September and October still have wonderful weather to enjoy.

Temperatures may drop a bit but are still very comfortable for summer clothes, the sun still has warmth, the countryside is fresh green after rain, the soils are still warm. Winter is coming, but emphatically is not here yet!

Harvest is over, the fields have been cleared, crops cut, and preparations are beginning for the next round of agricultural activity.

By October the maize will have been cut and stored for the Anaerobic Digesters it has been grown for as a feed stock.

Cover crops

During September you will surely have seen the bright yellow sunflowers in many local field margins, where they were sown as part of seed mixes for pollinators, wild birds and plant diversity. Minimal tillage and 'No-Till' farming needs the soil to never be without a green growing cover, which protects the soils from erosion, nutrient leaching, and soil structure damage. The cover crop will pick up nutrients in the soil and 'capture them' keeping them for the next crop.

Wild Hops and History

I found a wild hop growing in a hedgerow the other day. Hops are used as a bittering flavour, and a stability agent in beer, to which, in addition to bitterness, they impart floral, fruity, or citrus flavours and aromas. I presume these plants that I found are left over from when people brewed their own beer. Local farmers would have had a brewery in the farm buildings for themselves and all the people working on the farm. It would have been a condition of employment that the workers were given beer as part of their wages. Brewing also meant the water used was purified and so was 'safe' to drink.

The flower or 'cone' is the part that is used, which is grown on female plants harvested from the bines or stalks, and dried in oast houses with the chimney cowls on top. Hops have separate male and female plants, only female plants produce the cones. Pollination is prevented by only growing female plants in hop gardens. Pollinated seeds are not wanted in beer production

The first record of hops being used as flavouring in the UK was in the late 8th century with hops imported from the continent. The first record of hops being grown was in Kent in 1524. Ales were brewed without hops; beer is brewed with hops. It seems that monks were the original brewers on the European continent. Kent is the stronghold of hop growing in the UK, there were also important hop growers in Hampshire around the Alton and Farnham areas, and in Worcestershire. Hops are grown in 'hop gardens' with rows of tall posts, and stringing is done each year for the bines to grow up.

From here hop growing spread to the USA in 1629 with Dutch and English settlers. The type of hops grown varies with the local tastes where they are used.

Benefice Recipes

Well, we're bowling along into Autumn. The great tidy up and putting to bed of the garden, that sweet smell of bonfire smoke, the smell of leaves rotting down, lovely stewing apples. Even the sun seems more golden and magical, the air has a crispness, and everything is fresher. Then that thought of only 12 Fridays to Christmas pops into your head and bursts your Autumn bubble!

The recipe this month is a for a tasty Coleslaw.



Curried Celeriac, Red Cabbage, Pear and Walnut Coleslaw

You will need

300g Red cabbage, 200g Celeriac,

2 large ripe but firm Pears

3 tbsp Sultanas, 2 handfuls chopped walnuts

2 tbsp finely chopped shallots,

6 tbsp natural yogurt, 6 tbsp Mayonnaise,

2 tsp medium curry powder, 1 and a half tsp Dijon mustard,

1 and a half tbsp red wine vinegar

3 tbsp finely chopped cornichons or dill pickles

2 handfuls of fresh chopped parsley

Method

Whisk the vinegar, mustard, curry powder, mayonnaise and yogurt in a large mixing bowl. Add the chopped shallots seasoning with salt and pepper then mix again.

Cut the celeriac into matchstick size strips and toss with the dressing to stop them browning. Cut the pears into matchsticks but leave the skin on and stir into the celeriac.

Finely shred the leaves of the cabbage and add to the bowl. Stir in the sultanas, walnuts and cornichons and cover and chill until needed. To serve stir in some of the chopped parsley and scatter the rest over the top.

Dare I say it this would be lovely with Boxing Day cold meats.

Hello From Claire

Bonfires and golden leaves, hot chocolate and darker evenings. Good excuse to snuggle up and watch a movie?

Not a hope! Before we can rest and relax for the winter, we should take advantage of every fine moment to get the garden tidied and sorted. Watch out for hedgehogs heading for hibernation under the cut back vegetation, especially if that vegetation is going to be burnt. With any luck we'll have a few decent frosts this winter to knock back the slugs and bad bugs, saving our young plants from the munching in spring.

The herb for this month, well is it a herb? Or a bulb? Or a vegetable? Widely used in cookery, with other varieties that look stunning, and very useful for keeping pests at bay, garlic is a 'love is or hate it' plant. And while I don't think its benefits as a vampire deterrent will be put to much use, read on for how to keep the greenfly off your roses!



Garlic: Botanical name: Allium sativum: Family: Alliaceae

So, let's talk varieties.

The culinary garlic you can buy from any grocer can be roasted whole, crushed, chopped, minced, added to sauces, mince, mushrooms...it's so versatile!

However, when you buy a bulb of garlic you aren't just getting the ingredients for a meal – you're gaining the next seasons bulbs as well.

Separate the individual cloves, use what you need in the kitchen, and plant the remainder in the garden close to your

roses. As companion plants both benefit – the garlic keeps aphids and greenfly at bay, enhances the scent of the rose and keeps it healthy, while the rose provides a good windbreak that protects the garlic.

If you aren't a fan of eating garlic, there are the more decorative Allium with multiflowered globe heads. These are relatively easy to grow and come in a range of sizes and colours.

For those who are interested in foraging then late winter/early spring is the time to look out for wild garlic, *Allium ursinum*, whose distinctive smell will lead you

A Hint of Mint

As the seasons change, the vibrant colours of summer give way to the rich russet hues of autumn. Along the edges of our chalk streams, water mint plants are displaying their last splashes of pinkish purple. From July to October, this native plant brightens up riverbanks with its dense clusters of tiny flowers. Even in the colder months, you can still spot its square stems and oval, hairy, jagged-edged leaves.

Water mint is one of about 15 mint species that grow in the UK, although many of these are hybrids. Did you know, for example, that peppermint is a cross between water mint and spearmint – another of our native mint species? In fact, peppermint plants can sometimes be found growing in the wild near their parents.

As its name suggests, water mint loves to grow in damp places. It favours ponds, bog gardens, marshes, floodplain meadows, wet woodlands, and the margins of rivers. In an ideal habitat, it can grow to over 50cm tall and spread sideways through rhizomes (thick stems that grow underground) and runners (thin stems that grow on or close to the ground).

Like other plants that grow in and around our chalk streams, water mint plays a key role in protecting the habitat. It offers shelter to animals that frequent the margins, like juvenile fish, small mammals, and emerging riverflies. Its root system helps to stabilise the bank and shield it from erosion, which saves fish eggs from being smothered by sediment. Its flowers provide nectar to peacock, comma, and small tortoiseshell butterflies, while its leaves are a favourite food of mint leaf and green tortoise beetles.

As with the kind you can buy from the supermarket (which is usually spearmint or peppermint), water mint has aromatic leaves that can be used to make flavourful drinks and meals. But it's best not to use wild water mint for this purpose, because there may be pesticides, herbicides, or pollution in the area. Instead, see if you can safely get close enough to detect its bright and refreshing scent — a real treat on an autumn walk!
