

#### **Dear Friends**

"We're all going on a summer holiday, no more working, for a week or two" sang Sir Cliff Richard in 1963. No work for two weeks and time to spend somewhere else, "where the sea shines brightly ...like in the movies".

A simple song and its lyrics are about rest, laughter, enjoying beauty and a time when our "dreams come true".

Who would have dreamt back in 1963 that there ever would be a global pandemic and communities would be locked down, except perhaps Sci Fi writers fantasising about an alien invasion or malign superpower plotting to take over the world? I guess many now we have a dream that we can go back to work, to find again normal ways of working and relating, that we can holiday without restrictions and find space in life for our dreams to come true.

- <sup>3</sup> For the LORD is the great God,
- the great King above all gods.
- <sup>4</sup> In his hand are the depths of the earth,
- and the mountain peaks belong to him.
- <sup>5</sup> The sea is his, for he made it, and his hands formed the dry land.
- <sup>6</sup>Come, let us bow down in worship,
- let us kneel before the LORD our Maker;
- <sup>7</sup> for he is our God
  - and we are the people of his pasture, the flock under his care.

Lifting our hearts and minds in worship to God is the healthiest thing to do and we can worship God in the work season or holiday season and in the struggles and joys of our lives may I encourage you to worship God, creator of all, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.





support you have given the society while we have had to adapt to new ways of operating.


Then – we actually had **The Plant Sale** on 23<sup>rd</sup> May. With real people.

My mother has lent me a wonderful book 'The Glory of the Garden' from the pages of Country Life, and it's snippets span from 1897 – a veritable trove of interesting stuff. As we are in vegetable season I thought this appropriate.

#### April 17<sup>th</sup> 1937

**A COUNTRYWOMAN'S REMEDY FOR "DOLPHIN"** To the editor of 'Country Life' Sir, - Last year I was complaining sadly of the ravages of "dolphin" (the local name for black fly), when the woman who does my work told me that the water in which

rhubarb leaves have been boiled would, if syringed over the broad bans, at once drive away the menace. My broad beans were very bad and I really had no faith in the supposed remedy, but I tried it. The first spraying certainly improved the beans, so the next day I syringed the beans again, and this time completely destroyed the black fly. I believe, however, that it would be most

effective if the broad beans were spraved when the blossoms first began to open. The oldest and coarsest rhubarb leaves should be used. roughly torn into shreds, and a couple of liberal handfuls placed in a large pan with a gallon and a half of water. Boil for ten minutes, allow to



get cold, strain through a fine-mesh sieve, and use in the evening. A fine sieve is important, as otherwise the particles of boiled leaf are troublesome in the syringe. I have also found the rhubarb liquid a useful repellent of green fly on roses. -PHILLIPA FRANCKLYN

#### Note from Editor:

Rhubarb leaves contain Oxalic Acid. Beekeepers use Oxalic acid to destroy Varroa mites in bee hives. I am therefore not surprised that a concoction of Rhubarb leaves will kill black fly on broad beans.

Most of us have plants in our gardens and ponds that are not native to Britain – they originally came from other parts of the world and have been introduced to Britain by people. While these non-native plants can help us to create beautiful ornamental displays to enjoy, if they escape into the wild some become invasive, harming our wildlife and environment, economy, and even our health and the way we live.

#### But surely all plants are beneficial wherever they grow?

Once established, invasive plants are costly to control and the damage they cause can be irreversible. Pond and aquarium plants can be particularly devastating if they escape into a natural waterbody.

#### How can I help to protect the environment while enjoying my garden?

We all want to look after the environment and our native wildlife for future generations to enjoy.

#### New Pests to look out for

There has been a new pest around this year called the Alder Beetle, which is an eye catching metallic blue beetle about 5mm long. I first heard about it when someone rang me to ask if I had come across it, so I quickly brought myself up to speed and once I had done my homework I started to see adults and signs of damage in the countryside.

The adults emerge from the soil in late spring having spent the winter underground, and then



climb up host plants like Alder trees, hazel, birch and beech are other host species, although they will probably have a go at others. The adults and larvae eats the leaf surface leaving a netting effect in the leaf. This is not to be confused with the caterpillars that cause silk 'netting' seen in hedgerows caused by the caterpillar of the Ermine Moth. The numbers of Alder Beetle really have exploded in the last two years.

The effects are not likely to be fatal to the host. They are often seen near water, the worst infestations I have seen have been next to the rivers Test and the Wey. You may well see a few beetles in your gardens, they are very easy to spot, and the colour really stands out.

On the plus side Lilly Beetle have not caused me much trouble this year, speaking as a gardener!

#### **Butterflies to come**

At the beginning of June I found the first caterpillars in young stinging nettles, nests of small black prickly caterpillars that, with luck, will be the first generation this year of Peacock, Red Admiral or Tortoiseshell butterflies, I will have to wait to find out.

# IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster

#### Rain and Sun

This year May was a wet month, we had about twice the annual average at 126mm, but compared with last year when only 2.5 mm of rain fell, well below average, this year is a 50X increase! June has brought fair winds and sunshine as the jet stream shifted and the low temperatures gave way to better conditions. July is traditionally the hav month so if all goes well we can expect some good haymaking sunshine. The long term forecast, (or guesswork perhaps), promises



good weather, but it may be a plan to get us all to pitch a tent for our holidays!

#### **Growth Explosion**

Growth of all the vegetation in the countryside really got going after the rain started, supplied with a good supply of water and warmth. The work load on farms that had backed up during the wet weather was there to be attacked, and after some intensive work got caught up.

The grass in the fields was reluctant to get going in the dry cold weather, but did react quickly to the improved conditions, and although silage making was possibly two weeks later than usual, it did get done quickly, and the yields were good. My lawn was showing the same reluctance to grow, then it took off like a rocket and cutting has been a chore.

The crops come into flower in June, the ears of the cereals emerge and bean crops smell terrific. Oil seed rape flowered well with plenty of sulphur yellow flowers, now the pods will be filling as seeds grow.

Winter barley is the usually the first crop to ripen and normally is ready to harvest about six weeks after the ears emerge, which means that from the middle of July the combine drivers will be under starters orders. Oil seed crops should be second in line for harvest, spring barley and wheat coming along in August.

You will have heard the Prime Minister's call to 'Build Back Better' many times – a 'big-picture' vision for Britain's post COVID world that, given the struggles we have all faced recently, can seem too big and abstract to imagine. But, as with many of Boris Johnson's big ideas, it will happen.

Over the coming months, I would like to explore and explain what this could mean for Hampshire, North East Hampshire as a constituency, and Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop, starting with the environment.

We have all seen nature boom throughout our time in restrictions. At the start of the pandemic, newspapers and social media were full of images and clips of animals 'taking back control' of areas man has overused for generations. Venice waterways filled with fish and dolphins, previously well-trodden country paths bursting with wildflower and bugs – locally, I have noticed the bird song much more prevalently as we bound into spring. I don't think anybody could doubt that our connection with nature has been key to us being able to stomach restrictions put in place to protect us. Nature was given a chance to recover, and it did – we must now protect its recovery and include it in our thinking as we grow. Locally in Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop, this means the Council must continue to take it into account – not just for nature itself, but for our wellbeing too.

I have written many times on the regeneration of our retail centres, and I know it is an issue residents in Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop care about. COVID has given us an opportunity to reflect on what our towns and retail centres mean to us and to rethink our relationship with the buildings that bring our area down. We have some fantastic independent stores, pubs and restaurants in our local towns – these should be supported by increased footfall with attractive community and leisure facilities; and the concrete carbuncles of old replaced with new but in-keeping, traditionally-designed, architectural masterpieces for new shops and cafés too. Having previously been a Borough Councillor – when, as Deputy Leader, I led regeneration in Basingstoke – I know our local Council is fully equipped and able to bring these changes about.

'Build Back Better' is more than a slogan, it the groundwork of a plan across the country and here in North East Hampshire to still look and feel like home – whilst allowing it to mature and modernise.

# **Benefice Recipes**

Well the summer has arrived and hopefully the good weather with it. I think my days will begin with moaning about the cloud and mist and then in the afternoon moaning about the relentless heat and finishing off with bedtime, throwing windows open and complaining it's too hot to sleep. All this will be interspersed with days of "Well they didn't forecast this rain" or "They got this wrong again" and so it will continue to autumn.



Though it may be blissfully warm I have never come across a time when a sweet treat isn't welcome.... No still can't think of a time.

Whether it's cream teas on holiday or on a garden visit, the pick your own farms (one for me some for the basket) or a drippy Mr Whippy with an elusive Flake, there's no excuse not to indulge a teeny bit. There are plenty of beautiful salads to counteract those naughty but nice bits.

Lemonade Scones (yes I know, but it works) Makes 10-12 Oven 200c fan/400f/gas 6

#### You need

400g self-raising flour sifted, 175 ml double cream, 175 ml full sugar lemonade (any brand and still fizzy)

#### Method

Pre heat the oven. In a big bowl put the flour and then add the cream and lemonade.

Mix gently until it comes together and tip onto a floured surface. Press out till it's 2cm in thickness. Using a 6 cm cutter, gently cut out 10/12 scones. Dipping the cutter in extra flour will stop the scones from sticking and will avoid twisting the cutter. This should hopefully allow for an even rise. Re roll the mixture carefully to recut.

Evenly space on the tray and brush tops with milk. Bake for 12-15 minutes till risen and lightly golden.

Best served warm and eaten on the day of baking. Jam first cream on top. Controversial I know.

Not sure if this ice cream has been in here before but it deserves another outing. It is so easy and so yummy. Always smooth with no taking in and out of the freezer and mixing through. **Perfect No Churn Vanilla Ice Cream** 

397 g tin of Condensed milk (the thick one you spread on bread, you didn't hear that from me) 500ml double cream

2 tbsps of booze (whiskey, rum, brandy, vodka, Sherry, whatever you fancy) 1 tsp vanilla extract, A quarter tsp of fine salt

Whisk together the condensed milk, alcohol, salt and vanilla briefly.

In a separate bowl mix the cream to stiff peaks. Then beat in the condensed milk mix until we'll combined. Place into a freeze able container or a lined loaf tin and freeze for at least 6-8 hours.

For the children I omit the booze and use equal quantities of cream and condensed milk, less cream stops it freezing too hard. You can add lemon juice instead of vanilla or I like a splash of Camp coffee in it.

The alcohol in this doesn't give a huge amount of taste but it helps the ice cream not set too hard, due to the extra cream. If you fancy a swirl of puréed fruit rippling through that's delicious as well. Or try Nestles caramel tin and mix with the cream for a toffee flavour, very rich but so good.
