Dear Friends

Do you have a reliable source of information?

A unique way of timekeeping was discovered in Cape Town. From the foot of Table Mountain, a gun would be fired at noon. They pointed to a mounted telescope and explained that they could see a clock in a jeweller's shop window, declared to be the finest clock in the Cape.


I'm sure that you've spotted the fatal flaw in that process! Being without an outside reference point means we can't know what is beyond ourselves unless someone comes to tell us.

God has come into our world in Jesus to show us what he is like, he reveals our need, and He shows us that we cannot meet our own needs ourselves, we need someone from outside our situation.

Christians look to God to for their 'reference point' and in scripture find his word to be truth about God, about ourselves, about our needs and about God's remedy for our condition.

Many people like to talk about Christian values and though values such as love and justice are common to all peoples they are claimed as 'Christian', but what makes any 'value' Christian? Discuss. Sometimes I reflect that we don't often recognise honesty as a good starting point for talking about Christian values, perhaps as it challenges us so deeply. We claim the value of love and yet find ourselves saying, "I hate so and so". At that point some honesty would be a good thing, to admit and accept that we have failed in living up to the values in which we believe, proclaim and fail to fulfil.

When we say our Confession in church I am grateful for these and other words by which I acknowledge my sin to God "Almighty God, our heavenly Father, we have sinned against you





The Church of England

Sometimes we drift along in our lives not knowing basic things about all sorts of issues, until someone asks a question and we didn't even think about it until then. I was asked to do a short summary of the Church of England, as quite a few folk have no idea what lies beyond their parish church. How the Church of England is structured and governed is important and if we don't know, one day we may find ourselves in a difficult place because we never thought about the implications of change that come along from time to time.

In England, every inch belongs in **a parish,** which is an ecclesiastical area with a boundary, often set before Norman times. We now use "benefice" as well, which is usually a gathering of rural churches/parishes across a geographical area, with a population too small to warrant a paid full time minister/priest/vicar/rector in each community. You all live in the benefice of **Farleigh, Candover and Wield**, which consists of 4 parishes and nine churches: *Farleigh Parish*, uniting together *Cliddesden, Dummer, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop*; the *Candovers with Bradley – Preston Candover* as the parish church and *Brown Candover and Bradley* as daughter churches; *Wield and Northington*. Currently served by two full time clergy, this will go down to one full time and there is a faint possibility of having a second part time or retired vicar to assist, after Stephen retires, at some time in the future.

We are part of a **Deanery** – of Alresford, which consists of about 27 village churches, with a total population of 15,000; to pay for the clergy, their housing, pensions, training of new clergy, and support services, each parish pays an annual contribution called "Common Mission Fund" to the diocese. The total for this benefice for last year was about £130,000, (in 2020 Farleigh Parish paid approx. £64,000 of this) and the total for the deanery was about £430,000 last year. Diocesan budget is around £10m.

The deanery is part of the archdeaconry of Winchester, which is part of the diocese of Winchester, which is part of the Southern Convocation (or province) of the Church of England, under the Archbishop of Canterbury, whist the northern part, the Convocation (or province) of York is under the Archbishop of York.

The Church of England is part of the **Anglican Communion**, which has branches across the world, from Nigeria, which has the biggest Anglican Church membership of any country in the world, to Myanmar, Australia, countries in South America, North America – around 41 provinces.

Each province is self-governing – it is not like the Roman Catholic Church ruled from Rome; the Archbishop of Canterbury is not like the Pope, so has no authority over the Communion to direct in any way – nor has he power over the individual dioceses and bishops in the Church of England – he did not have the authority last year to shut the churches, as this rests solely with the incumbent, churchwardens and PCC!

Each diocese has a structure – parishes have their Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) which are the legally constituted bodies; there are deanery synods, led by the area Dean, clergy and synod reps, elected at annual church meetings.

These Deanery Synod members elect people to serve on the **Diocesan Synod** – each diocese has one, and these are responsible along with the bishop for the running of the diocese; and these deanery synod reps also elect people to the **General Synod**, which is the ruling body that makes decisions about church law and other matters. So – people in a parish to PCCs, deaneries, archdeaconries, dioceses, convocations, to Provinces, to the Worldwide Anglican Communion. The C of E is not the largest denomination in the world – it is the third largest – approximately 80 to 85 million – after the Roman Catholics - approximately 900 million and the Orthodox churches – Eastern, Coptic, Russian, Armenian; then there are the Baptists, the Pentecostal churches, Salvation Army, community churches etc.

We all need to remember that we are part of a gathered people or over 2 billion who follow Jesus Christ as our Saviour and Lord – not to mention the many hundreds of millions already rejoicing in the fullness of life in heaven, whom we will join one day when our time ends in this world.

Jesus only has **one church** - made up of all those who personally know Him and trust Him. He sees His Church, not His churches. We all belong to Him and to one another.

These notes may help you to understand the structures – to most of us they are irrelevant and sometimes I wonder if they try to justify the existence of some areas by producing report after report and making the right noises from time to time.... When the real job of mission is leading people to Jesus in the villages and helping them to grow into responsible, prayerful disciples of Jesus.



Walking with Wildlife

At first light, a great spotted woodpecker began to drum, tapping away at a dead branch from high in the canopy of a nearby ash tree. Breaking the silence of the early dawn, it was almost as if we had booked a wildlife wake-up call. Today we were travelling over to Noar Hill, near Selborne, for an Easter Monday ramble, passing through Newton Valence - well known for its springtime migration of toads heading to the village pond to spawn.

Well wrapped up against the brisk northerly breeze, we found the Noar Hill reserve transformed by winter work parties. Twiggy thickets and bramble tangles had been cleared to reveal more of the grassy humps and hollows of this intriguing refuge. The juniper trees, a native species, had been left intact, as if to guard this hillside. A juniper nursery here, regenerating on a chalky scrape, forms part of a plan led by Plantlife to conserve this endangered plant.

Searching for early cowslips, we chance instead upon violets galore. Patch after patch of tightly clustered flowers of an intense violet-blue, spread across the close-cropped turf. This splendid display is presumably a response to ground clearance in previous years. A gingery bee-fly, as stout and furry as a bumblebee, whizzes around the bouquets of violets probing for nectar with its long black plunger of a proboscis.

Mining bees have begun to emerge in these stop-start days of early spring. In the warm weather at the end of March, distinctive little cones of soil crumbs appeared, dotted across the turf or along the edges of earthen paths. These solitary bees have spent the winter underground, each snug in its own burrow.

The female of the tawny mining bee has a splendid furry coat of reddishgold, while the small brown male resembles a honey bee. They too forage for nectar and pollen here among the violets, as well as visiting the blossoms of blackthorn and fruit trees. On chilly frosty days, they remain in their burrows with their pencil-sized entrance holes neatly closed over.

COVID-19 Vaccine update

Nearly 29 million people in the UK have now received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, and the latest data report shows that as of 25 March nearly 27 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine have been given in England.

There will be a reduction of supply of COVID-19 vaccinations due to reductions in national inbound vaccines supply.

We are told that this should not impact the delivery of second doses. Vaccinations sites are still encouraged to continue their efforts in maximising uptake in cohorts 1-9 which are yet to be vaccinated and second doses.

On the Farm—Ben Robinson

At the time of writing (19th April), it's starting to get a bit dry out there. The only thing to fall out of the sky in the last three weeks has been several light dustings of snow which were hardly enough to wet the dust. We could do with a bit of rain to get both the grass and the arable crops moving. I have a bit of silage left over from last year but some farms could be looking at their dwindling stocks and getting a bit nervous.

The dairy farm I milk for has nearly completed it's first round of grazing having turned cows out on the 23rd March. Usually by now they would be able to graze the first paddocks for a second time. However due to the lack of re-growth caused by nightly frosts and lack of rain they will have to house the cows again within the next week. Dairy cow grazing needs to be at beer can height when they enter the paddock; golf ball height when they leave. Ideally cows need to be presented with fresh grass after each milking. This means moving plenty of electric fencing.

Lambing has gone pretty well, with ideal weather to get young lambs motoring and plenty of student helpers who worked hard.

The only dampener recently has been an outbreak of pulpy kidney in the ewes, causing seven to die suddenly. This is especially frustrating as I vaccinate the ewes against this condition before lambing each year. The vet carried out a post-mortem on three ewes and recommended upping the concentrate feed rate to give the ewes more energy to fight the infection. This strategy has worked so far, and was infinitely preferable to Plan B which involved gathering the whole flock and jabbing them with an emergency antibiotic. Penning ewes with two week old lambs would have been stressful on sheep and shepherd.

Lambs don't tend to flock together very effectively at such a young age and can easily lose their mothers in the scrum. Furthermore as an industry we are trying to limit antibiotic use as much as possible so vaccinating the entire flock with precautionary penicillin isn't a route I would want to go down unless it was completely necessary.

I wish to update you on recent events within the area and seek your assistance. If you can help please give me a call, direct.

I start with a warning and appeal as we have also been experiencing an increase in burglary to outbuildings, with the theft of tools etc., across the area. In Preston Candover overnight of April 7 and 8 two garages were broken into; whilst nothing was stolen it shows these criminals are active in our area. The area of Hook and Old Basing have also experienced an increase. Please keep sheds etc. secure with good locks and alarms if possible.

Slightly further afield in Dummer overnight of March 31 and April 1 a catalytic converter was cut off from a car parked in Bible Fields, the price of scrap metal has risen in recent times and such thefts are on the increase, a similar crime was reported in Axford back in February.

On Thursday April 8th 2021, at 1:18 pm, a silver Ford Focus was seen in Weston Road, Upton Grey. A resident was working in his garden when a woman described as Eastern European; 5 ft 5" tall, medium build with black hair, wearing a dark coloured coat and blue facemask, approached him.



Summary

The first week or so was generally dry with some fine, sunny weather though with a cool north and north easterly breeze. Low pressure in the second week brought wet and at times breezy weather from the 10th before drier and cloudy conditions with some sunny periods. There was drizzle and light showers for a few days from the 24th before further dry and some sunny weather. The last two days were warm, and at 71°F, the daytime temperature on the 30th was the warmest recorded here for March. Overall the temperature was average for the time of year with half the normal rainfall. The two previous months had below average rainfall, with the total for the year to date a fifth lower than the long term average.



Family Mediation Voucher Scheme

Separating couples are being offered £500 vouchers to spend on family mediation to help them avoid acrimonious court proceedings.

What's next?

The 2019 study provided a strong knowledge base for other researchers to build upon. Kieran Gething (Nottingham Trent University) and Tim Sykes (Southampton University) are further studying the Candover Brook and other Hampshire winterbournes through their PhD research.

Kieran's research focuses on the Brook's invertebrate communities, especially how its dry phases may support a range of beetle species. Tim's research examines the social value of intermittent streams, as well as observing the Brook's more elusive residents through camera traps - fleeting glimpses of otters and kingfishers have been caught so far. Volunteers from a local chalk stream scheme, Watercress and Winterbournes, will also soon be monitoring the Brook's wildlife. They will be performing regular surveys of riverfly populations, as well as water vole and American mink surveys.

Candover Brook: A hotspot for aquatic and terrestrial invertebrate diversity...







Researchers from Nottingham Trent University are pleased to share the results of research performed on the Candover Brook during 2019. The research, which was funded by the Environment Agency, aimed to assess the biodiversity of this important chalk stream.

Aquatic and terrestrial invertebrates were collected from the stream during both its flowing and dry phases. Lead researcher George Bunting identified more than 200 aquatic and terrestrial invertebrate species, and found that:

- Of the 200 species identified, six are nationally rare or scarce.
- Nationally rare species were found in both wet and dry reaches of the stream.
- Two of the nationally rare species, *Nemoura lacustris* (an aquatic stonefly larvae) and *Badister peltatus* (a terrestrial ground beetle), are specialists which thrive in streams which have dry phases.
- Two other nationally rare species, a mayfly larvae and a blackfly larvae, may also inhabit the stream. However, we have yet to capture specimens that can be identified to species level.

This study advanced our understanding of the biodiversity of the Candover Brook, and informed the ongoing development of methods that enable citizens and organisations to monitor chalk winterbournes.

We have, in recent weeks, announced details of almost three thousand organisations being offered grants and loans to help the culture and heritage sector reopen and recover from Covid.

And, of course, tens of thousands of freelancers rely on the creative industries for a living so it matters and I am proud we've stood with the sector.

Secondly, and as well as speaking in the key vote to put the 'roadmap' out of Covid into law, I have been speaking in Parliament recently about the importance of science centres in educating school children in STEM subjects.

We are fortunate to have Winchester Science Centre locally which has been focussing on education 5-12 year olds since 1986, giving almost 4000 children the opportunity to have informal science activities in the past year. Winchester Science Centre plans to reopen on Saturday 22nd May and I hope their main customer base – organised schools trips – will flock back trusting they can do so safely. The science saviour of the next pandemic may just be among them.
