



Dear Friends

My final "DF": Over the years David and I have tried to make you think, to present the good news that there is a God who loves us: who has made Himself known in Jesus Christ, whose life, miracles, ministry, healings, teaching, death on the cross for all our sins, and subsequent bodily resurrection in a transformed body fitted for eternity opens up forgiveness for us: Who returned to His Father and one day is coming again in all His glory to judge the world, and to take to Himself all who have received Him as Saviour and Lord, but who will also destroy all who have rebelled against Him and His ways. (yep, gospel in one really long sentence!)

My own conversion – turning to Christ, being born anew, coming to faith – all these phrases used to describe the moment when we put our personal trust in Jesus Christ – took place on 14 February 1971, during a hymn not in our hymnbooks here: "Who is on the Lord's Side, who will serve the King? Who will be his helpers, other lives to bring?"; since then I have tried to do just that – serve the King, and help others to realise their need of a relationship with Jesus Christ, so that they find the joy and hope of knowing God personally, having assurance of forgiveness and eternal life, and walking with Him daily.

God has not changed; His Word cannot be changed, and what He says applies to every human being – we are all equally loved by Him, invited into relationship with Him, and as we do so, we leave behind our sins, - actions, thoughts, and words - and demonstrate by the new way we live that Jesus Christ is living in us.

We live in a culture which is hell-bent on destroying the very basis on which it was built – on godly Christian virtues, truth and common sense – and where extremists appear to have taken over mainstream media, presenting only one point of view and treating with contempt any view which is contrary. The re-writing of history through warped and delusional worldviews and imposing a new tyranny, which seems to be led by mob rule through social media is an interesting moment in world history where The Truth – not "my" truth and "your" truth – is the biggest casualty – whether over marriage, biology of the human body, education, or a proper understanding of world faiths and politics.

Is this a cause for worry? Repeatedly Jesus said, "Do not worry, do not be afraid, do not fear." Jesus warned that in the last days these things would happen: "love of many good men shall wax cold", persecution of those who follow Christ would arise – as it is doing in many nations across the world.

1 Timothy speaks of many who will depart from the faith giving heed to lies, hypocrisy, and other things – we don't have to go far in the House of Bishops of the Church of England to find those who do not tell or have rejected the truth (I have personal examples so I am not speaking from theory) and propound heresy and a rejection of basic Christian truth. But Jesus will build His Church – working through those who DO walk in His ways. These are wonderful times to be a Christian, because in an increasingly dark world the light of Christ in us shines even more brightly. Are you in His kingdom yet? Have you invited Him into your life and are you daily being filled with His Holy Spirit? Too many people settle for less – and some cases FAR less- than the best – why be a spiritual pauper when we are



invited to be children of the One who owns everything and Whose Spirit will give us all we need and more?

One favourite hymn (amongst many!) says: "How good is the God we adore! Our faithful unchangeable Friend; His love is as great as His power, and knows neither measure nor end. 'Tis Jesus the First and the Last, His Spirit will guide us safe home: we'll praise Him for all that is past, and Trust Him for all that's to come."

I give Him praise for what has been achieved over the last decade as I have tried – imperfectly - to serve Him and you: what lasts is faith sown in lives that have encountered God's love, and entered real faith, or have matured through engaging with Jesus in prayer and His Word. People are what the gospel is all about, not buildings.

And we'll trust Him for what is to come – here for you, and for us -Julia and I and our family – Jo, Chloë, Jess and husband Jon, and grandsons William (5) and Arthur (5 months) – we will see what doors of opportunity He will open up for us in the next season of our lives.

I am sorry where I have offended or let others down; thank you for your support, encouragement, prayers and sometimes gentle disagreements: may God bless you all with His power to heal, save and encourage.

Summary of the Parish of Farleigh PCC meeting held on September 13th 2021

This was the first time in over a year that the PCC has met in person. It was good to be back together rather than meeting on zoom. Below is a summary of the key points discussed at the meeting, full minutes will be available on the Benefice Web site in due course.

Despite all the changes to church worship over the last year Eamonn was happy to report that the finances are in a healthy position, and we will be able to pay the final instalment of the Parish share this year. Many people have moved from cash payments in the plate to online payments and direct debits. However the forecast income is close to the expenditure so there is not expected to be much of a surplus to carry over to next year.

The Parish share is due to rise next year but considering the retirement of Stephen and the resulting changes to the Clergy team the PCC voted to write to the Diocese arguing that the Farleigh Parish share should be reduced next year.

Stephen is seeking feedback from churches about the Holy Communion procedures. In recent months communion has been received in individual cups but his proposal was to revert to a single cup. However, most churches it seems preferred to maintain the current procedure of individual cups. Feedback is sought from

members.

The PCC are still looking for a new treasurer to replace Eamonn who is planning to stand down next year. In the event that no-one steps forward the PCC agreed to consider proposals for the use of a professional bookkeeper to prepare accounts and manage the day to day financial aspects of the PCC. This will be discussed again at the next PCC meeting.

David presented the PCC with a proposal for the new service format and rotas from October onwards, after Stephen retires. There will be a total of 21 services each month across the Benefice and David's aim is to lead all the communion services and retain as much of the previous format as possible. The PCC accepted the proposed rota which includes one lay-led service each month in each church, whilst recognising that there needs to be some flexibility in service times as necessary. The details of the new rotas are presented elsewhere in this magazine. The PCC agreed to review the service patterns at the next meeting in November. In addition David intends to lead the provision of pastoral care including funerals, weddings etc but it's up to all of us to inform David of people who may be in need of a visit/prayer etc. David is encouraging members to consider attending a BCM training course in topics such as pastoral care and worship leadership. His goal is to build a team of lay members to help support pastoral care in the future.

The Diocese are planning to create a new post called 'House for Duty' which is intended for newly retired clergy. They receive a house in return for providing services on a part time basis. It is not likely that the current Rectory in Ellisfield will be the house used for this post. The church wardens will meet in October to define the profile for this position in Farleigh, but it is likely to be some time before this post is filled.

Bee Times in my Apiary

It is often said, by beekeepers, that the beekeeping year begins in August. It is the time of year when we are preparing our bees for the coming winter and spring. We need to make sure our bees are free from disease and are all in strong colonies, with adequate stores of honey and pollen to last till next spring.

Summer worker bees live very short lives. They work in the hive for the first three weeks of life and then spend the next three weeks foraging. In all a life of just six weeks during which they work themselves to death.

Winter bees on the other hand have to live for six months. They are the workforce needed to feed and rear the next generation of bees in spring.


A queen bee in a 'normal' year starts to reduce her egg laying rate towards mid-July. In a cold early winter she will stop laying around late November or early December and then start again in late January. The eggs she lays in January will need to be fed by the bees that have overwintered in the hive since the previous autumn. Winter bees are the result of eggs laid

by the queen bee at the beginning of September.

Honey bees suffer from a parasitic mite called *Varroa*. The mite lives on adult bees and breeds in the cells along with the young larvae. Thus an adult bee emerges with a mite already on her



body.



We treat the bees after the honey has been extracted, usually at the beginning of August. In

my association apiary this year we have used a treatment made from Formic acid, a naturally occurring chemical. The strips containing the treatment are left in the hive for about a week. The formic acid kills all the *Varroa* mites on the bees and can also penetrate the brood cappings, killing the mites on the developing larvae.

Responsible beekeepers will always leave some of their honey on the colonies to see the bees through winter., but if the year has been anything like this year, a lot of colonies will need feeding. The cold and rain has meant that bees have been unable to forage and collect as much nectar as usual, and their 'keeper will need to feed them sugar syrup. A ratio of 2:1 of granulated sugar is used in autumn.

The bees will store the syrup, to consume during winter. An average colony needs about 40kg of honey for winter. Feeding and treating the colonies can take us through to the end of October after which we close the colonies and protect them from pests. More about that next time.

Benefice Recipes

A hearty supper to go with the bags and bags of runner beans and ridiculously oversized courgettes.

Pork and Cider Casserole

You will need:

25 g butter, plus extra for greasing

1 tbsp sunflower or veg oil

4 pork chops

1 onion sliced

1 garlic clove crushed

600g potatoes thinly sliced (Maris pipers are best)

350ml cider or chicken stock

Method

Heat the oven to 150c (130 c Fan) gas 2

- Heat 10g butter and the oil in a large frying pan on a medium heat and brown the chops on each side until golden. Set aside.
- In the same pan cook the onion gently for 10 minutes till softened
- Add the garlic and cook for 1 minute so as not to burn.
- Grease a large deep casserole dish.

 Layer the base of the dish with half the potatoes and season.
- Add the chops, sliced onion and garlic then cover with the remaining potatoes.
- Pour in the cider or stock.
- Season and dot with the remaining butter, cover with a circle of grease proof paper and the casserole lid.
- Cook in the oven for 2 and a half hours until the pork is meltingly tender, remove the lid for the last 20 minutes or so to brown the potatoes if necessary.

I think this recipe could be jazzed up a touch with a stir through of some double cream at the end, and a sprinkle of crispy bacon lardons. Serve with some vibrant greens and a rustic hunk of bread.

It stars Clint Eastwood in an uncharacteristic and offbeat comedy role as a trucker and brawler roaming the American West in search of a lost love while accompanied by his brother/manager, Orville, and his pet orangutan, Clyde. In the process, he manages to cross a motley assortment of characters, including a pair of police officers and an entire motorcycle gang (the Black Widows of Pacoima), who end up pursuing him for revenge.

Eastwood's appearance in the film, after his string of Spaghetti Western and *Dirty Harry* roles, somewhat startled the film industry and he was reportedly advised against making it. Although it was very poorly reviewed by critics, the film went on to become an enormous success and became, along with its 1980 sequel *Any Which Way You Can*, two of the highest grossing Eastwood films. When adjusted for inflation, it ranks as one of the top 250 highest-grossing films of all time.


