

The Rev. Canon Charles Rycroft, (Ryc) Smith (1946-2023) A Tribute

Ryc Smith, who was Rector of the original Candover Valley Benefice, died recently. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him. He came to the Candover Valley with a sense of vocation which had grown over many years and with experience in several different fields. From an early age he was particularly influenced by a Franciscan Community in Cerne Abbas. After Agricultural College he worked briefly in Switzerland as a hotel porter. He joined the Army serving in the Horse Guards (Blues) for a short time. His sense of vocation grew and in 1976, with the strong and loving support of Pauline, whom he had married in 1969, he began to train for the Priesthood. He was ordained in 1978. He served as a Curate in parishes in Hereford and Maybush. Then in 1983 he became the first Rector of the newly created Candover Valley Benefice. He was with us until 1999 and for the last 9 years was also Rural Dean. In 1999 he moved from the Candover Valley to a Parish in Guernsey until 2007 when he became Priest in Charge at Beaulieu. He was made an Honorary Canon of Winchester Cathedral in 2014, shortly before he retired.

With his commanding presence, outgoing personality and ability to persuade, Ryc made a big impression on the Benefice, and, in various ways, he has left a lasting legacy. He started the tradition of the Good Friday walk, which has taken place annually ever since, save for the 'lock-down' years. He included Northington in the rota for Remembrance Day Services, even though, at that time, there was no War Memorial at which to conduct the final part of the Service. Ryc simply created a temporary War Memorial with a Cross of Poppies outside the West Door. With only four Parishes in the original Benefice Ryc was able to make home visits and managed to visit every single home, making a lasting impression on one contributor. A sermon led another contributor to become a regular Churchgoer. A third, who attended many Wedding Rehearsals, was struck by the care with which Ryc explained the significance and importance of the critical parts of the Service. Ryc encouraged Sunday Schools and services for children, which were specifically aimed at involving and interesting those attending and encouraging them to participate. He served as an ex-officio governor of Preston Candover Church of England School. The fact that he was often called "Ryc the Vic" was an indication of the respect and affection in which he was held by the whole community.

I am grateful to all those who contributed.

There will be a Memorial Service at Hereford Cathedral on Friday 22nd September 2023.

Coast to Coast walk for Charity

My son, Peter, will be taking the Coast to Coast track and walking the length of it for charity.

The two charities to benefit will be Macmillan Nurses (Peter's Stepmother died of cancer recently) and the Not Forgotted. Peter's Stepfather (Terry Frost) raises money for the NFG with the Wield Glenn Miller Tribute Band. Peter will start walking on 23 May and plans to finish on 7 June.

He will be walking in Wainwright's footsteps, starting at St Bees and ending at Robin Hood Bay. The total length of the walk is approximately 190 Miles which is about 12 miles a day. The longest stretch is 16 Miles and the shortest 9 miles.

Peter has been planning the walk for the past 10 months and has recently spent a weekend walking in the Lake District to try out his kit. He will be carrying a tent, mat, sleeping bag, clothes, waterproofs, a cooking kit for tea, coffee and some breakfasts and food for about two days. He says there are lots of shops and pubs on the way so he won't starve! His kit weighs 11kg and he is carrying a water filter so that he can collect water from streams and lakes along the way.

It is a tradition to dip your boots in the Irish Sea at the start and collect pebbles for loved ones, carrying them the whole way and throwing them into the North Sea at the end.

Peter says that the first five days are the hardest as it is through the Lake District and the hills are tough. Later on he will pass through the Yorkshire dales and the York Moors.

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

We were squelching along the bridlepath through Preston Oak Hills on a fine Sunday afternoon. These impressive oakwoods near Bradley have splendid displays of bluebells in early May. Blackbirds were chortling from somewhere high in the canopy now flushing yellow green with clusters of leaves and tufts of catkins.

The shady wayside verges first reveal a delightful array of native plants. There are the elegant arching stems of Solomon's seal, the sprawling white spangles of greater stitchwort, plus the glimmer and glow of yellow archangel. Tucked in at the edges of the path are the tidy trefoils of wood-sorrel. The puddles along the track seem devoid of life until we find one rippling with tadpoles, evidently a spawning pool for woodland frogs.

Beneath the oak trees, drifts of bluebells sweep away lit up by dappled sunlight, so creating a wonderful illusion of a mauve mist swirling across the woodland floor. Sitting on a log in a sunlit spot, we pause, immersed in the scent of bluebells. A peacock butterfly clearly the guardian of the glade flashes about, eyespots glaring. Looking up we see a red kite soaring above the trees, plus a great white sailplane gliding over from the Lasham airfield.

Although once in decline, cowslips have surged back in recent years with notable displays on chalk downlands, in wildlife gardens and along grassy verges. Apparently, Cowslip Sunday was once a feature of rural life in early May. Certainly, the wildlife charity, Butterfly Conservation, have created impressive cowslip meadows on their reserve at Magdalen Hill Down near Winchester.

On an earlier spring-time ramble, we were treated to a delightful vignette of three roe deer bounding through the cowslips with larks singing high overhead.

Pausing by the front gate at the end of an eventful spring day, I glance up to find a pair of swallows perching on the power line, their rich red throats and foreheads aglow in the light of the setting sun. Three house martins suddenly appear, flickering across the evening sky beyond – all back to their summer haunts.

- · Bites and stings
- · Colds
- · Congestion
- · Ear and eye problems
- Gastric and Bowel issues including indigestion and constipation.
- · Hayfever
- · Pain or swelling
- · Skin problems such as eczema, warts, verrucas and athlete's foot.
- · Mouth and throat problems

Once the Pharmacist has assessed you, they will recommend a suitable treatment.

Should the Pharmacist not be able to help you or your ailment needs to be escalated or referred to an alternative service, the pharmacist can then arrange this.

Have you had your NHS Health Check?

The NHS Health Check is a check-up for adults in England aged 40 to 74. It can help spot early signs of stroke, kidney disease, heart disease, type 2 diabetes or dementia.

An NHS Health Check is repeated every 5 years between the ages of 40 to 74 years, but the checks were paused during the Covid pandemic.

Be tick aware!

Watch out there are ticks about! It's the perfect conditions for these mini beasts.

Here's a helpful reminder of some simple 'tick tips' if you're out walking. These tiny insects, which can transmit bacteria such as Lyme disease, can be found throughout the year but are most active between spring and autumn. They are typically found in woodland, grassland, moorland or heathland but are also found in urban parks and gardens. When out walking, remember to keep to footpaths, avoiding long grass.

'Tick tips' for walkers include:

- Wear appropriate clothing (long-sleeve shirt and trousers tucked into your socks);
- Use an insect repellent.
- Wear light coloured fabrics that may help you spot a tick on your clothes:
- Inspect your skin for ticks, particularly at the end of the day, including your head, neck and skin folds (armpits, groin and waistband)
- Check your children's head and neck areas, including their scalp (skin on top of their head)
- Check that pets do not bring ticks into your home in their fur. If you do get bitten by a tick, removing it quickly and correctly can help to reduce any potential risk. The only safe way to remove a tick is to use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers, or an easy-to-use device which can be purchased from pharmacies or vets.

Then:

- Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upwards slowly and firmly, as mouthparts left in the skin can cause a local infection.
- Once removed, apply antiseptic to the bite area and keep an eye on it for several weeks for any changes

On the Farm—Julian Gibbons

May has been a hive of activity on the farm. The last of the spring crops went in at the beginning of May. This was actually a re-seeding of the first small field of spring barley we put in at the end of February. Although the barley was very good it was full of blackgrass, so the decision was taken to spray it with RoundUp and drill 2 days later with more spring barley without further cultivations. This emerged in 6 days. Drilling with our new drill is better now we have become more used to it. The last 2 fields were direct drilled into last year's bean stubble, hoping not to disturb too much ground thereby encouraging weeds to grow. They emerged really evenly, and we will see how they do.

As I write this, I am halfway through the main fungicide on the wheat. We are aiming to protect the top2 leaves from disease. The wet spring has meant there is more disease around then usual so we have had to increase rates slightly from where we would like to be. We have also added some foliar nitrogen to finish off the crop nutrition. This adds 7kg/ha of Nitrogen, and we use this to replace the last 40Kg/ha of solid nitrogen. We have used this approach for the 2 previous seasons, and it is backed up by independent research. It makes a significant reduction in our carbon footprint.

May has finally seen the spring malting barley and the last of the wheat move off the farm, both destined for the docks. The spring barley has gone to Portsmouth docks and the wheat to Southampton. We have very few local homes for our grain now, so these two ports are our most local homes.

With a lot of the news focusing on food inflation I thought I would update what has happened to grain prices.

The May 2023 wheat futures prices on the 23rd May 2021 was £171.45; by the beginning of January 2022 it had climbed to £195.80. We then had the invasion of Ukraine and by May 23 it peaked at £355.60. From that high a year ago, it fell to £252 by the end of the year and has fallen steadily since then to £183/tonne when the contract closed, £12/tonne higher than it's opening price. Unfortunately, our other costs have risen by around 50% in the last 2 years.

Robyn and I recently went to a farm visit and agronomy update where the expert advisors were telling us the thresholds for Cabbage seed weevil in flowering rape. Interestingly not one farmer said they would spray an insecticide on a flowering rape crop, regardless of pest thresholds. I certainly can't remember the last time we did, certainly not in the last 20 years.



Good news. Extra funding recently announced by the Government means **schools in Winchester** will get extra funding as part of an additional £2 billion investment announced in the Budget.

Each primary school will receive approximately an extra £35,000, and £200,000 for a secondary school. The Institute for Fiscal Studies says this uplift will mean 2024-25 will be the highest spending year in history for our schools which means funding is set to rise faster than forecast inflation in each of the next two years.

Schools received their first payment in May and will be able to choose how best to invest the extra funding, including to pay for teacher salary uplifts and teaching assistants. The remainder of the £2 billion will be used to increase Pupil Premium funding rates which supports disadvantaged pupils, local authorities' high needs budgets, and special schools, making sure every child with special educational needs and disabilities receives the support and high-quality education they deserve.

I am committed to delivering on one of my local priorities, including investing in a high-quality school to support young people to reach their full potential, particularly those who face challenges or who need extra support. Noone is pretending school budgets won't remain under pressure – and I know the issue of falling school rolls is a real challenge for some – but this is welcome news.

Secondly this time, and sticking with education, I recently visited Peter Symonds College to meet up with the Principal and to understand planned future changes between **BTEC and T-Levels**. The impact this could have on my constituents is stark given, from 2025, many BTEC courses will no longer funded. The sector claims this will greatly limit choice and I think they have a point, especially outside of London where, for-instance, media and other arts courses will struggle to secure the appropriate work placement needed to satisfy T-Level requirements.

I am now working with PSC and the Sixth Form Colleges Association and am seeking a debate in the Commons on the subject. I think there's a real issue with the Government pulling back from BTEC's, in favour of T-Level's, especially where there is no equivalent in the new qualification.

My Symonds time also included the official opening recently of the new Carville Building which will house the business, economics, and criminology classes. The building is a result of a successful bid for funding from the Department of Education which I supported.

Finally, I am launched a new series of constituency groups visiting the Houses of Parliament. We arrange a tour and time to have Q&A with me about the life an MP. Social tariffs

Social tariffs for utilities are special discounted deals available to certain low-income customers. Many people are not aware that this applies to Broadband too. They're generally cheaper than standard broadband tariffs, starting at just £12 a month. They also usually aren't subject to price rises or exit fees.

Whether you're eligible depends on your broadband provider. Some offer social tariffs to recipients of the following benefits: universal credit, pension credit (guarantee credit), income

support, income-based jobseeker's allowance and income-based employment and support allowance. Some providers include other benefits, too. The account holder must be the person receiving the benefit to be eligible. Think this might apply to you?

Are you wondering how to apply for other utilities social tariffs?

How will your children get to school in September?

Will your child need school transport organised by or subsidised by the local authority? If you are worried about the cost of travel for *your* children between yr R and yr 13, please get in touch with the School Transport team at HCC as early as you can, even if you are not yet sure where your child is going to school or college.

The cost of SEND transport for yrs 12 and 13 is rising in September by a massive 27% to reflect the increased costs of the service, so you may want consider appealing for your family.

The School Transport team are there all through the summer but receive up to 600 calls a day!! So, it's best to get in touch as soon as possible.

Please don't forget that both Hampshire and Winchester Councils have asked Citizens

Advice to help distribute Household Support packages money to those who need help too. The County diverts some of this money to the Community Pantries in the County (there is one at Unit 12, Wnnall) to enable any resident to obtain £15 worth of food for just £5. You can self-refer to a food bank too. At this point, I'd also like to thank our pantry and food bank volunteers who make all this possible. Contact Citizens Advice by phone, in person or online.




