

Dear Friends

Goodbye and thank you. Thank you for all your warm comments and good wishes sent to me and Ruth as we leave the benefice. Since arriving on April 1st in 2011 I have had the privilege of sharing in folk's lives in many different ways. Not least of which has been sharing the joy of couples in the solemnisation of marriage, the delight of holding newly born children at the font for baptism and helping many families with funerals. There has been so much more beside that, and I have enjoyed many conversations about faith, the privilege of listening to troubles shared or hopes explored and living in a beautiful area with you.

Some parting thoughts, firstly, I wonder what impresses you? An Oxford vicar now in his late fifties said that as a fit young man he was impressed by strength and physical prowess. In his twenties it was by academia as his friends gained graduate and post grad degrees. In his thirties he was impressed by business success as the financially able with business acumen accumulated wealth and made money, lots of it! He reflects now with the perspective of years that what impresses him most is human kindness. None of us needs to be very successful in anything to be kind, for it is always within our reach. In wedding services, we often hear St Paul's writing on love, described as patient and kind, that forgives and forgets, looks for the best and never ends, and concludes that without love all our abilities and talents are worth nothing, so primary and principle is love to a flourishing human life. As we often reflect, we do live in a beautiful area, and feel deep appreciation for the blessings bestowed through countryside and communities.

Sometimes I wonder at two things, firstly with appreciation for those who are quietly kind with common courtesy through to philanthropy, and secondly, I am surprised by unkindness, why treat people worthy of respect, badly or with contempt?

When I left teaching to 'enter the church' I quoted from St Paul to staff at my send off from Romans 1 that 'I am not ashamed of the gospel as it is the power of God for salvation' that we all need. The gospel, or good news, of Jesus is that there is real effect and power in Christian truth, that Jesus has wonderfully made a way to approach God and to receive from him the blessing of forgiveness of sin and hope of eternal life. This message has power to change us inside since it 'does what it says on the tin' and over the centuries so many have found in Christ, wonderful things. God who is impressively strong, powerful who knows everything and with great creative power made all things and owns all things is fundamentally kind. The gospel is essentially God's kindness towards us and for us all, even those who treat God with contempt there's invitation to receive from him! The gospel message though, is like an RSVP, and we do need to consider our response!

Beautiful Blue Butterflies

The rolling hills of Hampshire's chalk downlands are amazing havens for butterflies. These colourful creatures light up the landscape, and are a crucial food source for birds, bats, small mammals, and amphibians. If you take a walk around our local chalk streams, keep an eye out for these blue beauties – just remember that the females, which can be partly brown, present more of a challenge!

The earliest to emerge is the holly blue, which can appear as early as April. This first generation is followed by another in August, and sometimes a third in October. As its name suggests, this species tends to congregate around holly plants in the springtime, although the summer generation mostly relies on ivy. Unlike the others in our list, this butterfly is pale blue on the underside of its wings.

Britain's most widespread blue butterfly, the common blue, can roam due to the prevalence of its favourite foodplant: common bird's-foot-trefoil. You can often spot it in grassy areas, including along riverbanks. Look for individuals or pairs in late May, and again in late August. As with the holly blue, a third generation can sometimes arrive in October if the weather has been warm.

The chalk hill blue is the largest blue butterfly on our list, and the second largest in Britain. It is mostly confined to chalk downlands, as they are the main habitat for horseshoe vetch – its sole foodplant. Unusually, the chalk hill blue has just one generation, which emerges from July to September. The caterpillars secrete a sweet substance, so ant colonies will often protect them from predators.

Eating only horseshoe vetch is a trait shared by the Adonis blue, although this butterfly prefers to find its food on slopes with shorter grasses. Like those of the chalk hill blue, Adonis blue caterpillars have a symbiotic relationship with ants. Despite a significant decline in its overall population, this species can still be seen at sites across Hampshire in late May and late August.

If you're keen to learn more about these amazing animals, the local branch of Butter-fly Conservation holds guided walks throughout the spring and summer. To discover the wonderful world of chalk streams, explore the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme at hiwwt.org.uk/winterbournes. Our work is made possible by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Pollinators, Honeybees and the Asian Hornet – why should you care?

You may have heard about Asian Hornets in the news recently, as last year the UK has suffered its biggest incursion to date of this non-native species. We have gone from just a single nest in 2016 to 72 nests in 2023.

Why should any of us care, though?

Whilst the Asian Hornet does not pose any more danger to people than our native European Hornet, it is a prolific hunter of insects – eating ALL pollinators – but especially a threat to honeybees. Honeybees are conveniently housed in hives by us humans and this has made their colonies something of an Asian Hornet's equivalent to a MacDonalds drive-thru.

France was particularly badly hit last year, and the fear is that the hornets are homing in on the UK to take up permanent residence next. Number-crunchers have estimated that the economic impact of the loss of bee colonies in France could amount to €30.8 million per year and other estimated losses throughout Europe are huge.

For all you keen gardeners, walkers, tree surgeons ... it is worth knowing that Asian Hornets are much more aggressive than our native European Hornet if you get too close to their nest. Beekeepers who have been to talks by the experts have heard firsthand witness to an Asian Hornet attack and they say it is not something that they would want repeated ...

So, what is being done and what can you do to help?

A public awareness campaign has been initiated by DEFRA, the NNSS (Non-Native Species Secretariat), APHA (Animal & Plant Health Agency) and NBU (National Bee Unit). Among them, these departments aim to make as many people and organisations as possible aware of this species, to both help control its spread and to protect employees and the public.

Beekeepers across the nation, and across Europe, are uniting to try and stop the spread. It is an uphill battle, and we need as many eyes as possible to help us! Research by experienced insect geneticists is revealing that just one queen introduced to France in 2004 may be responsible for the spread of the entire invasion we have now. But when a nest is spotted and destroyed, the rate of proliferation is considerably slowed.

Most beekeeping associations will have a team of volunteers to help raise awareness, assist the NBU and monitor sightings, etc.

If you think you spot an Asian Hornet, try to take a photo and note exactly where you are. Download the Asian Hornet Watch App on your phone and report your sighting, using the photo you took. 'Or if you prefer you can send a photo via www.bit.lv/asianhornetreport.

The photo will be automatically sent to the NBU and inspectors will come to the site as soon as possible. Please do not attempt to catch or kill the hornet. It is essential that it can be traced back to its nest and for the nest to be destroyed. licensed staff from APHA and the NBU take over to track down and destroy the nest. It is illegal for nonlicensed organisations to do this.

We are grateful for all the help you can give to keep this invasive insect out of our area, keep all our pollinators safe and let the honey flow from our busy bees! Thank you in advance.



Summary January started mild and wet with Storm Henk on the 2nd. 

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On a fine winter's morning of hazy sunshine, we head up the valley to Chilton Candover, passing the brook flowing in full spate alongside grassy banks now white with splendid displays of snowdrops. Walking down from the busy Yard café at Chilton Manor Farm, we skirt the roadside pond where a pair of coots, sooty black with white bill and head shield, bob about on the clear waters. One of the coots clambers onto a willow branch where it dips into the water and begins a loud foot slapping display. She seems to be smacking down wet pondweeds onto the branch, probably as the basis for a nest.

Across the road, a robin sings from the edge of the yew avenue, an impressive feature of the landscape here. This private avenue of magnificent trees - the finest in Hampshire according to Peter Norton in his 2014 survey: 'The Avenue of Yew' - has been carefully managed by generations of landowners. The vews have weathered many a storm, with dead and damaged trees being replaced. Both a roost and refuge, the dense dark canopies host all manner of birds. The red fruit of the yew, the arils, are popular with foraging redwings. A Merlin App is a useful aide here, picking up the calls of both a blackcap and a bullfinch tucked away in the depths of a roadside yew.

Following the ambling path up Dundridge Lane with its mature hedgerows and snowdrop banks, we walk softly, pausing to look and listen. Amidst the background clatter of rooks and redwings, a distant song thrush begins to sing, and a great spotted woodpecker starts to drum. A wintering flock of tits and finches moves swiftly through the branches above us. Beyond Dundridge Copse, there are fine views over the downs to Woodmancott. Meadow pipits flutter and dance over a field, while red kites and a buzzard float overhead.

Looping back along the way-marked footpath across the fields and down to the farm, we hear an early skylark singing high above, but quite invisible.



On the Farm—Julian Gibbons

All the spring seed is on the farm now all we need is the right weather! The last half of February and the first half of March is really the ideal time to plant spring cereals and spring beans. In the Eastern Counties some farmers will plant spring barley over the winter following sugar beet crops, but it can just sit in cold soil and not do a great deal for not a great deal better yield or an earlier harvest date.

We have peas to plant as well, but they want to go in slightly warmer soils. They don't like emerging into cold weather where they can just sit and get eaten by pests. The same goes for linseed (although if the answer is linseed my brother quite rightly says I've asked the wrong question!) and spring oilseed rape. For these, warm growing conditions are the answer to most pest problems.

Although at the time of writing this, soils are still too wet, with days growing longer conditions soon change especially if we get a spell of easterly winds.

Fertilising of crops and grass starts in late February to get crops growing again. For grass where the main source of nitrogen will be from clovers it is about putting on a small amount to start grass growth. The clovers don't start fixing nitrogen until the soils warm up, so if you want grass to feed stock early, you need to give it a helping hand. The other 80% of nitrogen will come gradually through the season from the clovers and other legumes in the pasture.

We have a new fertiliser spreader arriving for the start of the season. There are 3 methods of spreading fertiliser. You can buy liquid fertiliser and apply it with your crop sprayer. You will use special nozzles or dribble bars to apply streams of liquid fertiliser rather than a spray. The aim is to get the fertiliser on the ground, not to stay on the crop leaves. The fertiliser is stored in large tanks, and these get filled up before the season and then during the season. It keeps barns for other uses. Solid fertilisers are either a granule or a prill. Prills are manufactured in a prilling tower, where they spin out molten fertiliser at the top of a large tower. It forms round prills in the air that then solidify as they fall to the bottom of the tower. To spread solid fertiliser, you can use a boomed pneumatic spreader where the fertiliser is blown along a boom to outlets spaced along the boom, where it rains out onto the crop. As with liquid fertiliser you only get fertiliser where you put it, they are however very expensive and if you have a lot of telegraph poles prone to damage if you aren't careful.

The most common method of spreading, the one we use is the twin disc machine. Here you have fertiliser feeding 2 spinning discs that spread the fertiliser in an arc behind the machine. If you are spreading 24m the actual machine will spread 48m, the overlap provides the evenness of spreading. This however results in fertiliser potentially being spread where you don't want it, into the field boundary.

So lots of work and innovation goes into restricting the spread to keep all the fertiliser within the field. So we have border limiters, automatic disc speed reductions and other fancy bits of software to alter the pattern. This all being done at a press of a button or in some instances automatically, GPS means it knows what it has put on where and ensure it doesn't get more than it should. Weigh cells regulate the flow of fertiliser. This saves money and the environment, but it has put the price of spreaders up considerably. They used to be around £12000 and now they are £30000+.

As our Member of Parliament, I regularly visited local schools. It's the most rewarding, and often hilarious, part of the job.

I find dedicated teaching (and support) staff who love what they do but there's not enough of them and, in particular, they tell me they just cannot recruit the teaching assistants they need to support an increasingly complex picture.

I am therefore really pleased to see a **new teaching apprenticeship** that will launch this autumn revolutionising the way schools recruit teachers while supporting more people to earn while they study for a degree.

The teacher degree apprenticeship will offer a high-quality, alternative route for people to become qualified teachers. This includes people who may not be able to take time out to study full-time for a degree such as teaching assistants or staff already working in schools, to access this route to a rewarding profession.

Trainees on the new teacher degree apprenticeship will spend around 40% of their time studying for their degree with an accredited teacher training provider, gain qualified teacher status and all tuition fees are paid for, so trainees won't be saddled with student debt.

I think it will be a game-changing opportunity for schools to nurture and retain talent from the ground up.

Secondly, because we Brits can sometimes be our own worst enemy, there's some really good news on the subject I wrote about last month in *The Oxdrove* – NHS dentistry.

Earlier last month, the long-awaited *Dental Recovery Plan* appeared. Its focus on prevention has to be right and the roll out of the 'Smile for Life' programme to reduce dental decay in children will see parents-to-be offered advice on baby gums and milk teeth with babies and toddlers in nurseries having tooth brushing as part of the daily routine.

Measures for short-term recovery are also welcome; some 2.5 million additional NHS appointments as well as additional money for NHS dentists to treat adults and children who have not seen a dentist in over two years and incentivising dentists to work in underserved areas with one-off 'golden hello' payments of up to £20,000. The idea of dental vans to help deliver care in rural and coastal areas is interesting and I will be seeing if we can get a slice of that.

The British Dental Association described my select committee's report on NHS dentistry as 'an instruction manual' to save it but I am clear achieving that will require all of this – and more.

11 March 1905

Riding Without Reins – Albert Smith, carter, Lower Wield ,was summoned for riding without reins on the highway between Northington and Old Alresford on February 27th. He did not appear. Police -constable Morris proved the service of summons and also gave the necessary evidence showing that defendant was in charge of three horses and a waggon, and that he was riding on the fore part of the waggon without any control over the horses. The Bench fined defendant 5s and 4s costs.
