

## LOCAL BEEKEEPERS URGE THE PUBLIC TO JOIN FIGHT AGAINST DESTRUCTIVE INVASIVE SPECIES

- Beekeepers across Hampshire are calling on the public to help spot and report Asian Hornet sightings as we head towards spring.
- The destructive insect poses the greatest threat to our native honey bees in a generation.
- Experts warns there could be catastrophic consequences for the UK's wider ecology if the insects are allowed to become established here.
- Asian Hornets can become aggressive when defending nests, posing a risk to public health.
- More nests were discovered in 2023 than in the previous six years combined.
- The cost to the economy in France, where Asian Hornets have become established, is estimated to be in excess of £26 million ever year.

Local members of the British Beekeepers' Association (BBKA) are calling on the public to be vigilant and look out for Asian Hornets and nests as we head into the warmer months.

Asian Hornets are an incredibly destructive invasive species that specialise in preying on honeybee hives - one Asian Hornet alone can kill 30-60 honeybees per day. First discovered in the UK in 2016, the insect has travelled to our shores from northern Europe, where there are now over half a million nests annually in France alone.

By 2022, just 16 Asian Hornet nests had been discovered in this country. But in 2023, this increased dramatically to 72 nests in 56 different locations, with Kent and the Southeast most predominantly affected. But there have been sightings in many other locations, including as far north as Scotland, and a credible sighting already reported in January this year, sparking fears the non-native insect may become established in the UK.

Experts are keen to point out that this is not just a problem for beekeepers but poses a significant risk to public health. Asian Hornets are aggressively defensive of their nests, which are often built in hedgerows and brambles, meaning disturbances by unsuspecting individuals could have dangerous consequences.

An Asian Hornet can be identified by its very distinct markings - they're a similar size to a European Hornet, which is two or three times the size of a common wasp and are black with distinct yellow lower leg.

The public are being urged to stay vigilant and encouraged to report any suspected sightings on the Asian Hornet Watch app, which is available to download on iOS and Android.

Expert teams from the National Bee Unit, part of Defra, will then be deployed to track hornets back to their nests, which are then destroyed.

Reporting a possible sighting of an Asian Hornet is quick, free, and easy and has the potential to make a huge difference in the fight against this invasive species.

#### **Veteran Practice**

This means that, as part of the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, we have a dedicated Clinician, Dr. Hannah Harring, you can read Hannah's statement here, who has specialist knowledge of military related health conditions and veteran specific health services. This is important in helping ex-forces to get the best care and treatment. If you are ex-forces, please let your GP know to help ensure you are getting the best possible care.

A veteran is someone who has served in the British Armed Forces (Regular or Reserve) for at least one day. Veterans also include any member of the Merchant Marine who has served in a war zone. This includes crew from convoys in World War 2 and more recently in the Falklands conflict and Gulf Wars.

About 18,000 service people move back into civilian life every year and whilst most of these individuals have similar levels of health to the general population, around 2,000 leave on medical grounds. The top reasons for medical discharge are for issues relating to back, knees, mental health, and hearing.

Being accredited means that a practice can better identify and treat veterans, refer them, where appropriate, to dedicated NHS services (such as the Veterans' Mental Health Transition, Intervention and Liaison service (TILS), the Veterans' Mental Health Complex Treatment Service (CTS) and the Veterans Trauma Network) and capture better epidemiological data to improve future health provision. It also means that the NHS is better able to meet the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, whereby the Armed Forces community, including veterans, should face no disadvantage in accessing health services and should receive priority care for military attributable conditions, subject to clinical need.

#### **CPRE North Hants District Group**

The team thought you would like to know what we have been involved with during January, February and March.

Basingstoke and Deane Draft Local Plan - the response to the Draft Local Plan consultation has been the focus of recent activity. Support from a planning consultant, to apply our responses to the position statements of CPRE Hampshire, allowed us to concentrate on individual sites detailed in the plan. We have objected to the proposed 'garden village' at Popham airfield but supported the development of a 'brownfield site' at Overton Mill. We also objected to the inclusion of warehousing at junction 7 of the M3 in the Local Plan and will be objecting to an application for 245 houses at Skates Lane, south of Tadley, a site which was excluded from the draft Local Plan.

Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan Valued Landscapes – the response highlighted the importance of valued landscapes and stressed the significance of inclusion within the plan and, indeed, all neighbourhood plan. These areas of country-side must be protected along with the content; take into account the criteria set out in the Landscape Institute's 2021 guidance on assessing landscape value outside of national designations (TGN 02/21). Heritage, Cultural Heritage, Landscape condition, Distinctiveness, Perceptual (Scenic, Wilderness, Tranquility), Functionality (important farmland) and Recreational.

We have made comment on:

**Local councils serving North Hampshire** - continue to plan to build more and more new houses, becoming new towns! The Government's faulty housing algorithm (standard mythology) places councils in a difficult position. The number of houses required to be built each year as a directive of the Government, on green fields, important farmland, and with no real attention to water supply, waste water/sewage, electricity, infrastructure, schools, doctors, wildlife etc. is nonsensical. **Speculative development needs to be stopped** —

unplanned piecemeal development is doing so much damage to our already stretched infrastructure.

Brownfield sites and high-rise building techniques (where appropriate) should be prioritised over destroying countryside, landscapes and farmland which is needed for food production. The Prime Minister, recently stated at the Farmers Conference, about the huge importance of farmland for food production in this country and how the countryside is, also, essential for recreational purposes for the wellbeing of all.

Green Belt countryside loss has tripled since 2012 – the countryside needs our protection now more than ever. 

**Summary** There was a somewhat unsettled start to March with below average temperatures and the coldest night at 25°F on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. It then became milder with temperatures for the most part above average from the second week. It remained unsettled throughout and there was a hail shower on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Low pressure brought wet and windy conditions in the last week, with a fresh to strong breeze on the 28<sup>th</sup>. This was preceded by the wettest day, and distant thunder was heard in the early evening of the 31<sup>st</sup>. Overall the month was dull and mild with a succession of frontal systems that brought rain on all but nine occasions, and total rainfall that was 145% of the average figure.

## Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On Easter Sunday, we head along to Micheldever Woods for a springtime ramble, passing hedgerows now flushed a fresh green. The bare canopies of the wayside oaks show a ruddy glow in the sunlight as their buds begin to swell. The ash trees alas have largely gone -just stumps remain following winter clearances. Victims of ash dieback, a fungal disease, it is hoped to replace them in the landscape with hardy hybrid elms.

The busy beechwoods ring with the call of a blackbird on this bright breezy afternoon. As we pass a stand of young silver birch now leafing up a delicate green, we note all manner of spring birdcalls. There's a robin busking with a song thrush; a wren trills low in the shadows, while overhead nuthatches whistle loudly. Farther on, a blackcap gives a virtuoso performance and even a tawny owl joins in with loud hoots.

Deeper in the woods there are muddy puddles, rain-fed, with some now rippling with tadpoles. Along the grassy rides, clumps of primroses are in flower, the pale-yellow bouquets attracting foraging queen bumblebees. Beneath the beeches, there's a glimpse of early bluebells. Strolling back along the perimeter path, we look across to the neighbouring fields at an apparent heap of ash logs, before realising that the logs have legs and tails. It's a huddle of fallow deer, having a siesta in the sunshine.

The following Sunday, we head over to Preston Oak Hills to squelch along the muddy woodland trails, sheltered from the blustery winds of Storm Kathleen. We follow the way-marked bridlepath leading from the roadside, where the verge is patched white with wood anemones laced with greater stitchwort and wood-sorrel. The damper banks gleam with lesser celandines. From deep in the oakwood, a song thrush takes the lead among the concert of woodland bird calls, with a great spotted woodpecker providing the drumming. Beneath the oaks the woodland floor is densely carpeted with emerging bluebells and unfurling ferns. As we pause to look and listen, a muntjac deer skips quietly by.







## Do you keep chickens or other captive birds? Important Information

From the 1<sup>st</sup> October 2024 everyone who keeps poultry and other captive birds must by law register on the National Poultry register. Previously keepers of more than 50 had to be register, but in an effort to combat Avian influenza and other avian diseases this requirement has been extended to all poultry keepers.

Bird keepers will need to provide information, including their contact details, site where the birds are kept and details of the birds (species, number and what they are kept for).

This will cover all kept birds including chickens, ducks, geese, guinea fowl, pheasants, but also pigeons, budgies, parrots and birds of prey. Search Poultry register on www.gov.uk for more details.

## **Swarraton and Northington WI**

After a late change to the WI Programme Patrick Kempe gave a talk titled 'Working backstage with Lorenzo and his amazing Lusitano horses'. He explained that Lusitano horses were bred in Portugal

originally for war, bullfighting, and dressage. Nowadays they are mainly used for dressage and have often competed in the Olympics for Portugal and Spain. Lorenzo, known as 'The Flying Frenchman', has a team of eight horses and trains them for a modern take on trick riding which includes bending them through obstacles or taking them over jumps while standing on their backs.

Patrick showed us a film of Lorenzo in action standing bareback on 2 horses, legs astride, while 6 more horses followed in perfect unison as they wove through an exacting course. The training is quite intensive and is done by voice commands, he told us about the horses and the places they have performed. His talk was enjoyed by the members, and he was warmly thanked.

New members are always welcome, we have a large selection of used books, the collection of used stamps and pennies for charity and any surplus plants or produce.

We also have an ongoing project for a really worthwhile charity called Days for Girls which involves sewing sessions held in Old Alresford Village Hall. #### On the Farm - Julian Gibbons

April finally saw some better weather for planting crops, although we did manage to get some spring barley planted in March.

Andy and I went many, many years ago to a talk by a mechanisation officer for ADAS (the old government advisory service). He covered the eastern counties and had a lovely slow eastern counties way a speaking. He said if making a seedbed in the autumn you think it might need one more pass with a cultivator or harrow it won't. In the spring if you think it might need an extra pass, it always will. This was sound advice and has always stayed in my mind even now in the age of minimum tillage and zero tillage.

The reasoning behind this is that an autumn sown crop has an extra 5-6 months to get itself established and produce shoots (or tillers as we call them). A spring sown crop has to get up out of the ground and grow quickly. An April sown spring barley crop will be in ear in 6-7 weeks. It needs to be planted in a much better seedbed to achieve this.

This has been a real challenge this spring. We had already decided that some of our heaviest fields we will fallow, plant a green cover crop and get them ready for wheat in the autumn. This decision was made easier by the severe shortage of spring seed. We have taken to just one pass with the cultivator for some years, but this year we were having to carry out that extra pass.

Where the sheep have grazed stubble turnips or green cover crops it has been particularly challenging. The rain combined with the sheep treading the soil down (poaching in our parlance), resulted in soil that was hard to penetrate with a cultivator tine. Often farmers talk of the golden hoof, the benefit of grazing livestock on arable fields. This will definitely not be one of those years.

What harvest will be like for these late sown crops will depend on the weather. Hopefully it will be better than last summer. In 2020 we had a late spring planting season, but seedbeds were good, and the weather was kind, and the crops did reach their potential, just lower than it might have been if planted in February and not April.

At least farming on the top of the hill we haven't got spring water coming up in our fields. You then have to treat it as though it were a river with all the restrictions on fertilising and spraying that is entailed. Someone did however comment on our ducks on the ponds that have been a permanent fixture of the winter at the top of Bradley Hill.

This year will, almost certainly, see a General Election and I am quite sure the environment will feature. Who knows, this time there may even be a full range of candidates.

What I know for sure is, whenever I visit a local school and talk to the next generation, it's right at the top of their agenda.

Good news recently therefore that the UK is the first major economy to halve its emissions – having cut them by 50% between 1990 and 2022, while also growing our economy by 79% over the same period. This compares to a 23% reduction in France and no change in the USA. You may not hear it from the media, or more partisan figures, but they are the official figures.

With renewables now accounting for more than 40% of the country's electricity – up from just 7% in 2010, this shows the UK is leading the way on cleaner energy. These reductions are largely due to cutting emissions from energy generation, through the shift away from using coal to using renewables. In 2012, coal provided almost 40% of UK electricity, but later this year, this figure will be zero.

So, the UK has cut emissions faster than any other G7 country over the last decade and this has allowed us to take a more realistic approach while reaching our green targets, to ease the burden on local families.

But that doesn't mean the work is stopping. Since September alone companies have announced plans for £30 billion of new investment across the energy sector, including to advance green technologies and support green industries of the future. We have also set more stretching targets for 2030 than most countries. We plan to cut emissions by 68% by 2030, which is more than the EU, Japan or the United States.

We have also increased our renewables electricity generation from just 7% in 2010 to nearly 50% now. In an election year, you can expect the cynicism to be at peak levels but I think these are all positive achievements.

Secondly, and linked in a way, Ministers have just announced we are increasing the State Pension by 8.5 per cent as we stick to the plan to for pensioners, offering dignity and security to those who have worked hard all their lives and paid into the system.

This year's increase, hot on the heels of last year's highest ever cash increase of 10.1 per cent, means that from the start of April pensioners are set to receive an extra £900 a year. Oh and you'll have seen the Chancellor commit to the Triple Lock; expensive but the right thing to do. And we are also continuing to protect those most vulnerable by boosting benefits by 6.7 per cent to ensure a genuine safety net exists whilst we support those towards financial independence through work.

## Jackie's County Corner for May '24

So good to see lighter nights at last! With summer events starting this month, please look out for The Watercress Way stand at local fetes and fairs. If you are running an event, please let me know- we'd love to come along.

Since the County Council took over responsibility for parking on roads right across the county, issues are arising right across the division, especially in Alresford.



This also means that *all* concerns about road markings, flooding, and road and street works faults must be reported online to Hampshire County Council. For simpler problems (including reporting fly tipping), you can use www. FixMyStreet.com too. The County Highways team does not have inspectors and relies mainly on public reports. If you see a pothole without a surrounding white line, it means one of two things: either it hasn't been reported or it isn't deemed bad enough. So please retain your tracking number and track it online as you would a parcel. If nothing gets done, please let me know., so I can chase it too.

The www.hants.gov.uk search box can help with most things, but recently, I have been asked how to apply for a Disabled Parking Bay (called a Blue Badge parking space) on the road near to the home of a household. This information may be of use to readers too. https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/parking/bluebadge/bluebadge-parking-place

The County Council has many roles, including social care of adults and children, but it isn't a housing authority. But I'm acutely aware that inadequate or expensive housing can make life more difficult.

I'm often asked 'how can I apply for a Council house or flat'?

To make a start, you need to look at the Hampshire Home Choice pages on the Winchester City Council website https://www.hampshirehomechoice.org.uk. This describes the process and what you will need to do to get started on your journey.

If you still live at home with parents, getting to the top of the list may take a while, and meanwhile you can see what is available for rent or for shared ownership.

The rain is pouring (again) as I write this, but even so, Water Companies are saying there may be a water shortage in the summer. A gentle reminder if your tap ran dry earlier this year: have you claimed your compensation yet? Affected residents have been granted sums from £30 to £400 so if you haven't made your claim yet, it may be worthy doing so. If you are struggling with your bills, you can also apply for a hardship grant using this link. https://www.southernwater.co.uk/water-for-life/community/customer-and-community-grants/customer-hardship-fund

The HCC 'Future Service's consultation is now closed, but the threat of loss of School Crossing Patrols, School and Subsidised Bus transport, and the smaller Recycling Centres (Alresford is the smallest of 24) is very real. We really need facilities within villages and towns to make sense of our community: without them we risk being merely a development of houses. I am currently asking residents who use the bus services -do they enable you to manage without a car? If they do, I'd love to hear from you. If they don't-please let me know why.
