





The departure of Stephen leaves me as the sole priest to maintain a pattern of worship that is as full as it can be. I will be in the Farleigh Parish for two Sundays per month per church to take services of Holy Communion.

We are given to understand by the Diocese that an appointment will be made after Stephen's retirement whereby a retired priest is offered accommodation in exchange for taking Sunday services, two day of work plus weddings and funerals. This is an unpaid role and there has been no indication of when this might be.



#### Reflections on 10 years in the Parish of Farleigh

Stephen's first curacy was in 1983 and since then he has served in a range of parishes, mainly urban with several hundred worshipers in one church. Coming to Farleigh was rather different; a rural parish with the smallest church population but the largest number of churches spread over a large area, each with their own characteristics.

Stephen was licenced in Farleigh just before Advent almost 10 years ago. One of his first duties was at a Christingle service, his first experience of this type of service. Although potentially hazardous with candles, children and flowing gowns the experience went without incident and is now a regular and popular event in the Advent season. In case you are counting Stephen informs us that he has been here for 520 Sundays- that's a lot of sermons!

### What changes has Stephen noted in the last decade and how that that affected the ministry?

There have been a lot of leavers and newcomers to the villages resulting in a change in demographics. The numbers on the electoral roll remains fairly constant but the age range has changed. This means having to work harder to build communities and encourage more people to take responsibilities. There are fewer children in Ellisfield and Dummer and in recent months Cliddesden has become the focus for children's services and young families. One of the recent highlights is the introduction of the new family service format at Cliddesden run by a team of willing [gifted] volunteers.

Stephen was appointed as Farleigh became part of the United Benefice of Farleigh and Candover's with Wield, bringing together the parishes and working as a team alongside David Chattell. He has enjoyed working with David they complement each other with different strengths. Stephen and David have always supported each other and regularly prayed together As a result we have had the benefit of both Stephen and David for the last 10 years sharing duties and introducing new initiatives. In Stephen's view this has opened up our Parish to broader populations which brings with it some efficiencies and provides the option for combining resources and sharing events. This has in his view offered an element of stability and sharing that would not have been possible without the united Benefice.

#### What are the highlights?

Stephen successfully introduced Messy church with a great team which ran for 5 years until a couple of years ago when the children grew up and moved on to other things.

In particular Stephen has enjoyed the Exploring Faith and Lent Courses that he ran as well as the Benefice Lent courses that have become a firm favourite on the Lent agenda for the last few years.

Stephen has introduced us to a variety of new hymns as well, some of which have become firm favourites.

He has run at least one confirmation course each year and at least 20 people went on to be confirmed. He enjoys the challenging questions that are raised during these more informal courses.

Stephen and David have run Marriage Preparation days since 2012, which have been honed, polished and improved each year as different issues have arisen to add in to the day. 2021's preparation was run entirely on Zoom, which although it went very well, was missing the interaction with couples face to face, particularly missing the brilliant lunches that the folk from Cliddesden Church provided each year. The courses were a great gift to the couples who all so appreciated the care, attention to detail and humour with which the material was

Sophie Duncan married Dan Du-Heame in August 2013. She was christened at St. Martins and grew up in the village and attended one of the marriage preparation courses. Here are some reflections on the course:

"I'm in my nothing box!" ... a phrase regularly heard in our household and one of many interesting concepts introduced to us by Stephen during our 'Marriage prep' sessions. Lots of what we discussed in those meetings have been invaluable in helping us understand one another and also the commitment we were entering in to. Stephen's reassuring words, thought provoking questions and kind understanding were a perfect precursor to our big day.

#### Lango.

The deanery of Alresford has had a link with this northern Ugandan diocese since the mid-1970s. Stephen has played a leading role as a member of the Lango Committee, helping to rejuvenate the link with a trip in 2017; sadly the link is being severed as no-one in the deanery wants to take on the task. A link with another country and its Christians always helps to give us an international view of the Kingdom of God. Stephen had made 6 previous trips to Uganda between 1993 and 2010 taking small teams to teach, preach and encourage the Church.

#### **Rural Challenges?**

Sundays are intense, it is generally a one man show with limited support and involves driving between services along sometimes hazardous country lanes. In larger churches there are likely to be more staff and lay ministry and only one church. One of the challenges has been persuading people to come forward for lay ministry. However in the last 2 years there has been more involvement with lay members, including leading prayers, Cliddesden family community, regular prayer meetings and bible study groups.

#### And Finally...

There is Stephen the U-tube video star! Covid- 19 will be a remembered as a significant time in the last 2 years of Stephen's ministry but, not deterred that churches were closed for worship, he embarked on a weekly pre-recorded video, clocking up more than 60 videos recorded between March 2020 and April 2021. He was aided by his daughter Chloë who happens to be a rising star in the film industry with skills that allowed editing of clips, and turning them into a seamless video. Not only did these provide a much appreciated service to the locals, there were many hundreds of hits worldwide including Africa! There are a lot of wasps in the UK, an estimate of 9,000 species, most you will not see or notice as they can be very specialised and not striped yellow and black. Garden wasps - Vespula vulgaris – are social and live in nests, and do not bother us for most of the year. As the queen lays eggs, the workers collect insects for the carnivorous larvae which they chew up for the larvae, and get a sugary reward from the larvae by a process known as trophallaxis. (no- me neither!).

As the colony builds up, the queen, which mated in the previous autumn, will lay fertilised eggs that develop into queens and mate for next year. As the wasps reach maturity and leave the nest the workers are left with nothing to do and start to become troublesome as they look for a sugar hit, maybe from our picnics. This switch tends to happen at about the same time each year — mid August. They tend to sting at this time of year as a means of protecting themselves if they are disturbed. It is best to ignore them and avoid swatting wildly at them.

The nest can stay, although I will be vigilant for queen wasps looking for a place to hibernate in the house in October.

# IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster

#### Summer weather, quite contrary, how does the harvest go?

Just when you can see the finish line, a final obstacle comes into view which you did not want to see, which was not wanted, needed or expected, but was always a possibility. And this is just what has happened this year. Prolonged damp conditions are a significant cause of harvest delays, and while the combines are held off, the crop quality can deteriorate. The costs of drying the crop in store will also rise as gas, oil or electricity are needed to blow warm air through the heaps.

Despite the delays, it is worth looking for any advantages of the season, such as warm, moist soil for the next crop to get a good start when it is sown. If a cover crop is going straight in after harvest to collect fertilizer that might otherwise be leached, to protect the soil from erosion, or maybe create a better soil structure and improve soil organic matter, then the damp seedbed is a great advantage, and the cover can be expected to get a quick start. Fodder crops of stubble turnips for sheep or cattle flourish for the same reasons.

#### <u>Geosmin</u>

September is when the first signs of autumn are there to be seen, smelled and felt. There could be low lying mist in the morning, fungi, or a chill in the evening, some colour in the leaves of trees, all hinting at the seasonal change. Geosmin is an evocative smell, and is the name given to the main odour component given off by newly disturbed soil. But early autumn can be just as variable as any other season, we may yet have a drought to balance the wet of July and August, and prediction is easy with hindsight!

#### **Wasps- Fascinating Insects**

In mid-August I noticed that a wasp nest had started under the eaves of house roof, just behind the gutter and down pipe. What I could see of the papery structure was not very big, about half the size of a tennis ball, but there was lots of activity with more or less non-stop incoming and outgoing wasps. It was a warm day and so we could expect the wasps to be in top gear. There was so much activity that I did wonder if the visible papery entrance was hiding a hole they had found behind the sofit and maybe inside they had already built a much bigger nest.

#### **Beekeeping Facts – foraging**

As well as water, honey bees forage for three other things - nectar, pollen, and propolise.

**Nectar** is the bee's only source of Carbohydrate and is collected from flowers and trees. A bee colony in a hive will contain as many as 60,000 to 70,000 bees in an average summer. An average colony needs something like 136kg (300lb) of honey per year just to survive from day to day. When collected, nectar contains about 80% water and 20% sugar. Enzymes are used as well as fanning by the bees to reduce

the water content to 20% or less making the sugar content about 80%, after which we can call it honey. In this concentration the honey is unlikely to ferment. Once the water content has been reduced the bees 'cap' it with pure new bees wax and it can remain in that state, without deteriorating, for centuries. Honey was found in a pharaoh's tomb and it was still edible! Some flowers such a geraniums have 'nectar guides' that you can see, they guide



the bees to the

nectar in the centre of the flowers.

**Pollen** is high in nitrogen and is the bee's only source of protein. An average colony needs to collect and eat about 45kg (100lb) of pollen to survive. No single pollen

delivers the range of protein requirement so bees need a varied diet of pollen. With access to only one source would suffer from malnutrition, just as we would if we ate only peas! Many of our native

flowers produce a lot of pollen but very little nectar and some flowers, like the poppy, produce no nectar at all.

**Propolis** can be thought of as 'bee glue'. It is a sticky residue exuded by trees such as poplars and the sticky buds of Horse Chestnut trees. It has antiseptic properties and is used around the hive for a number of different purposes. Young bees line the cells in the brood nest with propolis before the queen lays an egg there. This ensures the young larvae are hatched into a clean, pathogen free environment. Bees will often reduce the entrance to the hive to make it easier to guard; they can mummify intruders such as slugs in winter, thus preventing the decomposing body from



contaminating the hive. It is often said that the old worker bees (worker bees are all female!) are sent out to collect propolis as it is very sticky and cannot be removed from the legs of the bees by the collector. Instead, other workers pull it away and, in the process, will often pull the legs off.

### **Cliddesden Primary School**

I look back on a particularly challenging academic year for all our school community. September brought the full reopening of school and with it a very differently organised system in school. The children all adapted to the changes ever so quickly and carried on being the fantastic learners that they are.

As Christmas approached things got more complex and worrying for every-body but we soldiered on in the uncertainty of what the spring term would be like. The January lockdown was announced and again the school 'closed'. I use this term in inverted commas as we didn't close. The children of key workers and those deemed vulnerable still attended and we had about 25% of the children on a daily basis, some attending full time and others on certain days.

The other children engaged in their learning at home and the teachers took on planning for blended learning, teaching at school and preparing on line lessons. We all found Google Classroom very useful and for most children it worked well. Parents were fantastic in helping and encouraging their children to work at home. We know how challenging this can be.

We have had a very productive late spring and full summer term and even though so many restrictions are still in place, we have managed to have educational visits, a sports day and lots of creative learning.

I would like to thank all my staff for being fantastic over the last year and adapting their practice to meet the needs of all our children; they have gone above and beyond. I also thank our Governing Body for their work this year.

I sincerely thank parents for putting up with so much change and uncertainty this year but continuing to give the school their full support.

I am so thankful that we are one of very few schools nationwide that have not had to close any bubbles this year so far. It may in part be down to luck but I also believe that it is down to our school's meticulous planning and risk mitigation, and most of all down to parents being careful and keeping themselves and their children safe. I hope we can continue to keep CV19 away over the next term.

### Benefice Recipes

A tasty recipe for hedgerow foragers.

# **Blackberry Cobbler** Serves 6 **For the blackberry filling**

800g washed blackberries, 100g caster sugar, Juice and zest of half a lemon 1 tbsp cornflour, 1 tsp vanilla extract, Pinch of salt

#### For the cobbler

125 g Plain flour, 50 g caster sugar, 1 1/2 tsp of baking powder 50 g cold butter cubed, 60 mls milk, 1 egg lightly beaten An egg for brushing the cobbles

In an oven safe dish, toss the blackberries with the sugar lemon juice and zest, cornflour, vanilla and salt. Let it sit for 30 minutes.

Pre-heat the oven to 180c or 160c fan. In another bowl, sieve together the flour, sugar and baking powder. Work the butter in with your hands to a crumble stage then stir in the milk and egg until just combined; you may want to add a bit at a time so it doesn't become too wet.

Dollop the cobbler mixture onto the blackberries in spoonfuls, brush them with the egg wash and add a sprinkle of sugar (Demerara is nice and crunchy) Bake for about 405 mins until the top is deeply golden (stick a skewer in to check if you want) and that the blackberries are bubbling.

Leave to cool for 10 minutes or however long you can last then top with cream, crème fraiche, ice cream or custard. It's very adaptable you could add apples or just use plums, nectarines, blueberries, peaches or a frozen mixture from the depths of the freezer.




